Option I: The way the catalog copy is stated, a student needs nine hours of core coursework to be chosen from fine arts, world literature, and philosophy. Thus, the student could select WLIT 1113, WLIT 1123, and PHIL 2003 to fulfill the Honor Scholars requirement, leaving him/her without a fine arts course. Option I will be changed to specify that the student must select at least one course from fine arts to be sure to satisfy the state core requirement.

Option II: Similarly, under Option II, a student could select their fine arts/humanities coursework in such a way that the student would be short of a minimum state core requirement. The curriculum is being changed to require that the student complete a university/state core fine arts course. Under Option II, students satisfy the humanities requirement for the university and the state when they complete the first three courses in the Honors Roots Culture sequence (HUMN 1114, 1124 and 2114).

Students who complete the 16 hours of Honors Roots Culture coursework (HUMN 1114, HUMN 1124, HUMN 2114, HUMN 2124) complete a substantial amount of work in the humanities that meets, if not exceeds, the spirit of the Humanities Colloqouim course required of all 4-year Fulbright honors students.
