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## Clarifying Notes on Degree Requirements

1. Courses that are required in either $W$ alton College or the international business core and also are required in one of the business concentrations cannot be used to satisfy both requirements. For example, students who take FINN 3703 to satisfy the finance concentration requirements cannot also use it to satisfy the international business requirements. 2. Students who select ECON 2013 and ECON 2023 to partially satisfy the social sciencebloc and a foreign language numbered 20032013 to partially satisfy the fine arts and humanities bloc of the U niversity Core Requirements can complete the degree with 125.120 hours. Students selecting other courses to satisfy these requirements will have longer programs.
