AAST 499v: African Americans in Sport (approved in Fall 2013 to become AAST 3023) (taught by adjunct faculty)

JOUR/COMM/AAST 3263: African Americans in Film

9. List of new courses and course descriptions for distance technology courses for the degree listed above. Indicate which new distance technology courses will be taught by adjunct faculty.

AAST 2023: African American Experience

Examines the various facets of African American culture that collectively construct the African American experience including art, literature, drama, migration, film, and education. Covers issues facing African Americans through a cultural and socio-political context to understand and appreciate

African American impacts on the United States.

AAST 3123: African American Studies in Higher Education (taught by adjunct faculty)

Examines the impact of college enviornments on African American students. Focus on the following topics regarding African American students: retention, student demographics, student characteristics, current trends, issues and problems, student success, sub-populations, student values, and implications for higher education.

HIST/AAST 3233: African American History to 1877

History of the African American experience in North America emphasizing economic, social, and cultural perspectives. Topics include the African slave trade, the creation of race and racism, the institution of slavery, free community formation in North, and the impact of the Civil War and Reconstruction on African Americans.

HIST/AAST 3243: African American History since 1877

The course will study the major social, political, and economical issues relating to the African American experience beginning with the late post-Reconstruction period and will include, all of the major personalities and influences in the Civil Rights Movement, from 1877 to the present.

AAST 499V/SCWK 405V: Social Work with African American Families (taught by adjunct faculty) This course is designed to provide students with an overview of both historical and contemporary issues facing African American families utilizing culturally competent and strengthens-based theoretical frameworks. The purpose of this course is to focus on the black family as a social institution and will heighten awareness and sensitivity to the contemporary problems affecting the black family.

11. Discuss the provisions for instructor-student and student-student interaction that are included in the program design and the course syllabus.

The African & African American Studies Program highly values student-student and instructor-student interaction. In the face to face environment, it has been central to the program's development and mission over the last decade. As the program begins to offer an online minor, we firmly believe in the centrality of interaction at all levels and have a commitment to maintain that engagement with our students. Each course has or will have an electronic discussion board providing students asynchronous communication with each other and the instructor in an open environment. Simultaneously, several courses either include blogs or

wikis to allow students to interact on group projects or engage each other and the class material. The faculty will remain as responsive in the online world as they are in the face to face environment by being available to students via email as well as phone and, in some cases, virtual office hours using Blackboard collaborate.

12. Provide a semester-by-semester degree plan/course schedule for student access to all courses necessary to complete the program.

The African & African American Studies Minor requires 15 hours of required coursework. AAST 2023 (African American Experience) is one of two required gateway courses and will be offered each semester (Spring, Summer, Fall) to accommodate new students entering the program. However, AAST 2023 is not a pre-requisite for any other AAST course, thus students can enroll in courses for the minor in any order. The program anticipates developing AAST 1003: Introduction to African and African American Studies in the future, pending approval of the online minor.

Students are also required to take either HIST/AAST 3233 (African American History to 1877) or HIST/AAST 3243 (African American History since 1877) or HIST/AAST 3253 (History of Sub-Saharan Africa). HIST/AAST 3233 and 3243 will be offered each semester (Spring, Summer, Fall) to accommodate student access. The program plans to develop HIST/AAST 3253 in the future, pending approval of the online minor.

The remaining 9 hours of required coursework are electives chosen at the discretion of the individual student. The program expects to offer AAST 3023 (African Americans in Sport) on a regular basis (Spring, Summer, Fall) and will offer JOUR/COMM/AAST 3263 (African Americans in Film) in both semesters of the academic year (Spring, Fall). Additionally, AAST 3123 (African American Students in Higher Education) and AAST 499V/SCWK 405V (Social Work with African American Families) will be offered at least once during each academic year (Spring or Fall). Additionally, students may also use either HIST/AAST 3233 or HIST/AAST 3243 (detailed above) as an elective if they did not already apply that course to the above listed requirement. This rotation will offer five course options yearly for students who need to take three courses. The program anticipates adding an additional two electives in the future, pending approval of the online minor. Therefore, a student has the opportunity to take all 15 required hours in the same year if he or she desires.

Instructional support for designing and maintaining all classes will be provided by the University of Arkansas (Fayetteville) Global Campus' instructional design team as well as IT support from the University. Course management and delivery support will be provided by the Blackboard infrastructure at the University of Arkansas (Fayetteville). Library related services, bookstore, and other services provided to ensure student success will likewise be provided by the appropriate units at the University of Arkansas (Fayetteville).

Costs for course development (Spring 2014 and later): \$4,000 per course x 4 course: \$16,000

Within the first three years (August 2014-August 2017), the program expects to add an additional four courses to the online course rotation. This will cost an additional \$16,000.

Additional Graduate Assistant to support teaching online courses and maintain current face to face SSCH levels when faculty teach online in-load: \$13,919 per year

The program anticipates the creation of revenue streams from distance enrollment. All development costs should be recouped from this revenue stream within a reasonable period of time. It is expected that these

	revenue streams provide funds to cover the additional instructional costs identified, as well as possible costs of student services incurred for the delivery of the program.
