We are currently graduating students who will need to conduct singlegender Men's Chorus as part of their jobs, and yet do not offer any training or experience in that area. Surrounding comparable schools (U of Kansas, Oklahoma State, Oklahoma, North Texas, Missouri State, Tennessee, LSU) all offer a Men's Chorus as part of their curriculum. In the state of Arkansas, Arkansas State University has the only collegiate men's chorus offering. No other collegiate program offers a Men's Chorus. <br> This proposal is to realign the choral offerings at the U of A to better serve our student community.
