<u>Below 3.00 Cumulative GPA</u>

If a Fulbright College Honors Program student's cumulative grade point average falls below 3.00 at any point, the student is immediately removed from the Honors College and the Fulbright College Honors Program.

Fulbright Honors Academic Integrity Policy

All Fulbright <u>College</u> Honors students are held to the highest <u>standards regarding</u> standard with regard to academic achievement and academic integrity. Any student <u>who violates</u> violating the Academic Integrity Policy <u>and</u> who receives a sanction of 1.0 or more (two 0.5 sanctions or a one-time sanction of 1.0 or more) at the University of Arkansas <u>is</u> will be permanently removed from the Fulbright <u>College</u> Honors Program.
