Require all music majors, with exceptions to follow, to enroll in MUEN 3411 (Concert Choir) during the first semester of their freshman year; transfer students who need to meet this requirement will be expected to enroll in Concert Choir in their first semester of residence. Exceptions to the requirement would include all students pursuing the Bachelor of Music (BM) degree for whom voice or piano is the applied area. Also, eliminate MUAC 1381 (Class Instruction in Voice) as a required class in the BM- Music Education degree with either Wind/ Percussion or String emphasis.

Eliminate MUTH 3603 (Music Theory III) as a requirement for the Music Education degree program, and add MUED 4112 (Pedagogy in Music Education) as a requirement for the Music Education program.

# 9. Reason for proposed action:

Tourism is now the largest global industry with annual tourist spending increasing 6.7% each year. The impact of over one billion annual international visitors has caused many environmentally sensitive sites to deteriorate at accelerated rates. This interdisciplinary Historic Preservation program at the University of Arkansas is designed to improve the alliance of the emerging field of cultural tourism with historic and landscape conservation, architectural preservation, and cultural resource management. Historic preservation is a solid international career direction and an emerging field in the U.S. This program will guide students with a basic knowledge of historic preservation that will prepare them for entry-level careers in cultural tourism, architectural building materials conservation, historic preservation, and cultural heritage management. In most important European universities like l'Universitá di Roma, Sorbonne, Cambridge and Ca' Foscari in Venice, similar historic preservation programs are now core

curricula for the related fields of anthropology, geography, art history, geology, material science, history, architectural history and regional studies (e.g., European, Middle East Studies). As our regional studies programs grow in size and visibility, this program represents an ideal bridge between the primary majors and the regional study emphases (i.e. Geography and Middle East Studies or European Studies and International Relations). In the U.S., similar programs have been housed in Anthropology (cultural thrust), History (historical focus), Art & Architecture (restoration & conservation) and Geosciences (materials and inter-departmental). Implementation of the Historic Preservation program at the University of Arkansas requires only the organization of current courses and the creation of a capstone course.

# 10. New option/concentration/emphasis objective:

As the only program of its kind in this state, this curriculum was created to prepare students with a fundamental expertise in the fields of architectural conservation and preservation and the geographic methodologies associated with cultural landscape interpretation and analysis. Eighteen credits of combined classroom and field, theoretical and applied training will be required over a maximum five-year term for completion. Class equivalencies are permitted with documentation of course requirements (including related course syllabi) and approval of the course instructor, student advisor and Program Coordinator. There are no prerequisites for entry into the program. All except one class is regularly offered on the University of Arkansas Fayetteville campus. Only the capstone course Materials Praxis is a newly created class and will involve a twoweekend participation commitment by the Program students. The program's faculty includes experts, practitioners, and researchers in cultural resource/heritage management, materials science and stone conservation, architectural history and criticism, urban morphology and planning, rock weathering and deterioration and computer cartography. If a student wishes to conduct Historic Preservation research or pursue a related career overseas, it is suggested that they take classes in a University of Arkansas regional studies program (i.e. European, Latin American, Asian or Middle East Studies) in addition to the minor.

\* This will be a required field and laboratory-based capstone course that will require two weekends (Saturday & Sunday) for completion. Unlike any class at the University, this materials course (GEOG-3033) has been specifically designed for this program and will discuss the nature of building materials (wood, brick, mortar & stone), their identification and properties, weathering & erosion theory, assessment and mitigation (i.e. cleaning, consolidants, innovative trends). Program Coordinator Professor Tom Paradise has taught similar classes in Italy and Jordan.

Note: Participation in the University of Arkansas' ROME STUDY CENTER semester in Rome may be used as an alternative to the required courses from sections a) History of Architecture, and b) Urban Studies for six credits (6). Additional substitutions may be used for supplementary courses (i.e. Hazards & Risk) taken in Italy for a total up to nine (9) credits from involvement in the semester in Rome with the University of Arkansas.

# **B. New Course Descriptions**

GEOG 3033 Building Materials Field Studies and Laboratory Study of durable building materials, their availability, strength, deterioration, limitation and utility. Historic construction techniques, identification of architectural materials, architectural elements assessment, causes and mechanisms of deterioration, conservation and treatment of architectural materials, preservation philosophies and standards and creation of a practical field identification kit will also be covered.

#### ANTH 4443 Cultural Resource Management I

Concentrated discussion of management problems relative to cultural resources, including review and interpretation of relevant federal legislation, research vs. planning needs, public involvement and sponsor planning, and assessment of resources relative to scientific needs. No field training involved; discussion will deal only with administrative, legal and scientific management problems.

Upon finishing this minor in Historic Preservation, and their academic major, students will be able to work in both private and public arenas, improving the alliance between the emerging field of cultural tourism and the fields of historic and landscape conservation, architectural preservation, and cultural resource management. With an ability to identify community needs, as well as their acquired knowledge of materials (i.e. brick, stone), legal issues (i.e. laws, variances, regulations), and technical skills (i.e. cartography, surveying), students will provide a valuable new expertise in this emerging field to communities in the US and abroad.

This minor will not be offered through distance learning since hands-on applications (materials praxis course) and laboratories (cartography) are fundamental to the program.

Advertising/Public Relations is a high demand major nationwide. Many advertising and public relations, journalism and mass communication programs have instituted GPA requirements and limited enrollment policies to maintain the quality of education for the students. Such requirements help programs provide quality teaching, limit enrollments to available resources, and better prepare students to work in the field. Some programs enroll students only on a "seats available" basis. Thus students who meet entrance requirement are informed they are not automatically guaranteed acceptance into a program.

Major benchmark universities in the region and nationwide have instituted such requirements. For example, the University of Texas-Austin Advertising Department requires students to complete their introductory advertising course with a grade of B or better. Students must also meet an overall GPA of 2.25 to be considered for admission into advertising studies. The University of Georgia Advertising and Public Relations Department requires an overall GPA of 2.5 and does not guarantee acceptance. At Louisiana State University, "students with a 3.00 LSU GPA and a 3.00 cumulative GPA are given priority for admission on a space available basis." At the University of Missouri-Columbia students must maintain a 3.0 GPA "to ensure advancement to upper-class status" and "it may be necessary from time to time to limit enrollment in high-demand areas." It "does not guarantee first choice of sequence" including advertising.

Therefore, it is imperative to institute advertising/public relations GPA requirements to help our graduates to be competitive with those from neighboring, benchmark programs such as Texas, Louisiana State and Missouri. We propose instituting a 2.25 GPA entrance requirement in the Advertising/Public Relations Sequence only. Journalism majors must have a GPA of 2.25 or higher to qualify to enroll the Ad/PR sequence or in the introductory advertising and public relations classes (JOUR 3723-Advertising Principles and JOUR 3743-Public Relations Principles). We would retain the existing requirement whereby students must earn a grade of B or better in JOUR 3723 and JOUR 3743 to continue in the sequence.

Student demand for the Ad/PR Sequence has increased dramatically over the past two decades. For example, the spring 1986 departmental enrollments were 62 in the Ad/PR sequence, 67 in Broadcast, 96 in Print/News, and 28 undecided for a total of 253 majors. In fall 2004, there were 235 students in the Ad/PR sequence, 97 in the Broadcast sequence, and 68 in the Print/News sequence. (The total is 533, which includes 18 students enrolled in 2 or more sequences.)

Thus, over the past two decades, the Ad/PR sequence has grown from the smallest to the largest sequence comprising about half of our majors. Our Ad/PR faculty and resources are strained by this growth. Only two of the department's nine tenured faculty are in Ad/PR. One adjunct instructor also assists in teaching the Ad/PR courses. (We are in the process of trying to hire another Ad/PR tenure-track faculty member.)

These demands are exacerbated by our accreditation status (which again is in the best interest of the students). The advanced Ad/PR skills courses are to be taught in a lab and capped at an enrollment of 15 students. In addition, we are trying to build the academic research component of our department. To do so, we need to provide our productive Ad/PR faculty with course load reductions.

There are other indications that demand for this subject area will remain strong. The Marketing Department recently inquired if we could offer an Ad/PR minor to their students, estimating that approximately 300 students might be interested. While we cannot offer a minor now or in the foreseeable future, this indicates the additional potential demand for and interest in this subject area.

As per Department of Music Curriculum Committee and Faculty discussion and approval, MUTH 3603 (a study of 18th century counterpoint compositional techniques) does not meet a "relevance test" for current Music Education students.

Also, MUED 4112, Pedagogy in Music Education, is proposed as a requirement for upper-level Music Education students.

Preparing, presenting, practicing, and assessing music concepts in music classrooms are necessary skills for music education students, and are specifically required of them upon placement at internship sites and in professional environments.

Currently no course focuses on providing practice of teaching musical concepts and related, necessary teacher behaviors.

The intent of MUED 4112 is to provide additional laboratory (peer teaching) experience, not substitution or duplication of existing MUED 3-4000 level courses.

This program has been extremely successful in the past and is entirely self-supporting. The University of Arkansas had 6.2% black student enrollment in 2001. This undergraduate degree completion program has had 10+% black students each year since 1996. Dropout rates are less than 2%. It is anticipated that the next cohort will be equally successful in attracting and retaining black students.

# 9. Reason for proposed action:

Tourism is now the largest global industry with annual tourist spending increasing 6.7% each year. The impact of over one billion annual international visitors has caused many environmentally sensitive sites to deteriorate at accelerated rates. This interdisciplinary Historic Preservation program at the University of Arkansas is designed to improve the alliance of the emerging field of cultural tourism with historic and landscape conservation, architectural preservation, and cultural resource management. Historic preservation is a solid international career direction and an emerging field in the U.S. This program will guide students with a basic knowledge of historic preservation that will prepare them for entry-level careers in cultural tourism, architectural building materials conservation, historic preservation, and cultural heritage management. In most important European universities like l'Universitá di Roma, Sorbonne, Cambridge and Ca' Foscari in Venice, similar historic preservation programs are now core

curricula for the related fields of anthropology, geography, art history, geology, material science, history, architectural history and regional studies (e.g., European, Middle East Studies). As our regional studies programs grow in size and visibility, this program represents an ideal bridge between the primary majors and the regional study emphases (i.e. Geography and Middle East Studies or European Studies and International Relations). In the U.S., similar programs have been housed in Anthropology (cultural thrust), History (historical focus), Art & Architecture (restoration & conservation) and Geosciences (materials and inter-departmental). Implementation of the Historic Preservation program at the University of Arkansas requires only the organization of current courses and the creation of a capstone course.

# 10. New option/concentration/emphasis objective:

As the only program of its kind in this state, this curriculum was created to prepare students with a fundamental expertise in the fields of architectural conservation and preservation and the geographic methodologies associated with cultural landscape interpretation and analysis. Eighteen credits of combined classroom and field, theoretical and applied training will be required over a maximum five-year term for completion. Class equivalencies are permitted with documentation of course requirements (including related course syllabi) and approval of the course instructor, student advisor and Program Coordinator. There are no prerequisites for entry into the program. All except one class is regularly offered on the University of Arkansas Fayetteville campus. Only the capstone course Materials Praxis is a newly created class and will involve a twoweekend participation commitment by the Program students. The program's faculty includes experts, practitioners, and researchers in cultural resource/heritage management, materials science and stone conservation, architectural history and criticism, urban morphology and planning, rock weathering and deterioration and computer cartography. If a student wishes to conduct Historic Preservation research or pursue a related career overseas, it is suggested that they take classes in a University of Arkansas regional studies program (i.e. European, Latin American, Asian or Middle East Studies) in addition to the minor.

Unlike any class at the University, this materials course (GEOG-3033) has been specifically designed for this program and will discuss the nature of building materials (wood, brick, mortar & stone), their identification and properties, weathering & erosion theory, assessment and mitigation (i.e. cleaning, consolidants, innovative trends). Program Coordinator Professor Tom Paradise has taught similar classes in Italy and Jordan.

Note: Participation in the University of Arkansas' ROME STUDY CENTER semester in Rome may be used as an alternative to the required courses from sections a) History of Architecture, and b) Urban Studies for six credits (6). Additional substitutions may be used for supplementary courses (i.e. Hazards & Risk) taken in Italy for a total up to nine (9) credits from involvement in the semester in Rome with the University of Arkansas.

GEOG 3033 Building Materials Field Studies and Laboratory Study of durable building materials, their availability, strength, deterioration, limitation and utility. Historic construction techniques, identification of architectural materials, architectural elements assessment, causes and mechanisms of deterioration, conservation and treatment of architectural materials, preservation philosophies and standards and creation of a practical field identification kit will also be covered.

#### ANTH 4443 Cultural Resource Management I

Concentrated discussion of management problems relative to cultural resources, including review and interpretation of relevant federal legislation, research vs. planning needs, public involvement and sponsor planning, and assessment of resources relative to scientific needs. No field training involved; discussion will deal only with administrative, legal and scientific management problems.

Upon finishing this minor in Historic Preservation, and their academic major, students will be able to work in both private and public arenas, improving the alliance between the emerging field of cultural tourism and the fields of historic and landscape conservation, architectural preservation, and cultural resource management. With an ability to identify community needs, as well as their acquired knowledge of materials (i.e. brick, stone), legal issues (i.e. laws, variances, regulations), and technical skills (i.e. cartography, surveying), students will provide a valuable new expertise in this emerging field to communities in the US and abroad.

This minor will not be offered through distance learning since hands-on applications (materials praxis course) and laboratories (cartography) are fundamental to the program.

Advertising/Public Relations is a high demand major nationwide. Many advertising and public relations, journalism and mass communication programs have instituted GPA requirements and limited enrollment policies to maintain the quality of education for the students. Such requirements help programs provide quality teaching, limit enrollments to available resources, and better prepare students to work in the field. Some programs enroll students only on a "seats available" basis. Thus students who meet entrance requirement are informed they are not automatically guaranteed acceptance into a program.

Major benchmark universities in the region and nationwide have instituted such requirements. For example, the University of Texas-Austin Advertising Department requires students to complete their introductory advertising course with a grade of B or better. Students must also meet an overall GPA of 2.25 to be considered for admission into advertising studies. The University of Georgia Advertising and Public Relations Department requires an overall GPA of 2.5 and does not guarantee acceptance. At Louisiana State University, "students with a 3.00 LSU GPA and a 3.00 cumulative GPA are given priority for admission on a space available basis." At the University of Missouri-Columbia students must maintain a 3.0 GPA "to ensure advancement to upper-class status" and "it may be necessary from time to time to limit enrollment in high-demand areas." It "does not guarantee first choice of sequence" including advertising.

Therefore, it is imperative to institute advertising/public relations GPA requirements to help our graduates to be competitive with those from neighboring, benchmark programs such as Texas, Louisiana State and Missouri. We propose instituting a 2.25 GPA entrance requirement in the Advertising/Public Relations Sequence only. Journalism majors must have a GPA of 2.25 or higher to qualify to enroll the Ad/PR sequence or in the introductory advertising and public relations classes (JOUR 3723-Advertising Principles and JOUR 3743-Public Relations Principles). We would retain the existing requirement whereby students must earn a grade of B or better in JOUR 3723 and JOUR 3743 to continue in the sequence.

Student demand for the Ad/PR Sequence has increased dramatically over the past two decades. For example, the spring 1986 departmental enrollments were 62 in the Ad/PR sequence, 67 in Broadcast, 96 in Print/News, and 28 undecided for a total of 253 majors. In fall 2004, there were 235 students in the Ad/PR sequence, 97 in the Broadcast sequence, and 68 in the Print/News sequence. (The total is 533, which includes 18 students enrolled in 2 or more sequences.)

Thus, over the past two decades, the Ad/PR sequence has grown from the smallest to the largest sequence comprising about half of our majors. Our Ad/PR faculty and resources are strained by this growth. Only two of the department's nine tenured faculty are in Ad/PR. One adjunct instructor also assists in teaching the Ad/PR courses. (We are in the process of trying to hire another Ad/PR tenure-track faculty member.)

These demands are exacerbated by our accreditation status (which again is in the best interest of the students). The advanced Ad/PR skills courses are to be taught in a lab and capped at an enrollment of 15 students. In addition, we are trying to build the academic research component of our department. To do so, we need to provide our productive Ad/PR faculty with course load reductions.

There are other indications that demand for this subject area will remain strong. The Marketing Department recently inquired if we could offer an Ad/PR minor to their students, estimating that approximately 300 students might be interested. While we cannot offer a minor now or in the foreseeable future, this indicates the additional potential demand for and interest in this subject area.

We propose adding only the new GPA requirement at this time to allow access to as many students as possible, yet limit enrollment somewhat to provide a competitive program. By instituting only one additional entrance requirement at a time, it allows us to limit enrollment gradually. That way, we allow as many students as possible to participate in the sequence. It also leaves us additional options for limiting enrollment in the future, if necessary.

Students will receive college credit for the omitted aural perception courses when they have validated their higher placement by passing the course in which they are placed with a grade of "B" or better.

As per Department of Music Curriculum Committee and Faculty discussion and approval, MUTH 3603 (a study of 18th century counterpoint compositional techniques) does not meet a "relevance test" for current Music Education students.

Also, MUED 4112, Pedagogy in Music Education, is proposed as a requirement for upper-level Music Education students.

Preparing, presenting, practicing, and assessing music concepts in music classrooms are necessary skills for music education students, and are specifically required of them upon placement at internship sites and in professional environments.

Currently no course focuses on providing practice of teaching musical concepts and related, necessary teacher behaviors.

The intent of MUED 4112 is to provide additional laboratory (peer teaching) experience, not substitution or duplication of existing MUED 3-4000 level courses.

From 36 to 50 students participate in each new cohort, which starts every fall. Drop out rates are extremely low, averaging 1 to 2%. ## 8. DESCRIPTION OF RESOURCES

Rich Mountain Community College has a distance-learning laboratory and will host students from the Mena area. The library at Rich Mountain Community College will also be available. In addition, program faculty will assist students in accessing the University of Arkansas library through electronic media. Faculty will also provide additional support through webpage supplements.

## 9. PROGRAM COSTS

Costs for administrative support, faculty, equipment, facilities, library resources, research activities, and distance delivery, will be supported on a cost-recovery basis through student tuition. The Division of Continuing Education, University of Arkansas, will administer the program, collect tuition, enroll students, and support faculty travel and salary. No additional costs will be incurred by adding Rich Mountain Community College to the existing rotation.

# 10. SOURCES OF FUNDING

Tuition and fees will be used to support the program on a cost-recovery basis. The Division of Continuing Education, University of Arkansas, collects tuition and fees, reimburses faculty for travel, pays faculty stipends, and supports marketing of the program through tuition generated by student enrollment in this program.

# 11. BOARD OF TRUSTEES APPROVAL

The Board of Trustees approved the program on November 15, 1995. This is a request to add an additional off-campus site.

# 12. SIMILAR PROGRAMS IN ARKANSAS AND IN ADJOINING STATES (BACCALAUREATEAND ABOVE)

There are no other programs like this in Arkansas or in adjoining states.

#### 13. DESEGREGATION

The University of Arkansas had 6.2% black student enrollment in 2001. This undergraduate degree completion program has had 10+% black students each year since 1996. Dropout rates are less than 2%. It is anticipated that the next cohort will be equally successful in attracting and retaining black students.

# 14. INSTITUTIONAL/CORPORATE AGREEMENTS

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the University of Arkansas and Rich Mountain Community College and a letter of invitation from Rich Mountain Community College are attached.
