Two program changes proposed.

1. The objective is to train teachers and scholars in Hispanic studies at the doctoral level. The interdisciplinary framework provided by the Comparative Literature and Cultural Studies Program will strengthen the specialization in Hispanic Studies and open professional and research opportunities to its graduates. By this virtue, the new track will make the Comparative Literature and Cultural Studies Program more attuned with the state and national needs in language and literary studies, considering the growth of the Hispanic population in Arkansas and the U.S.

With a strong Spanish Bachelor of Arts (100 majors), an interdisciplinary Latin American Studies Program (80 majors), and a nationally competitive Spanish Master of Arts (20 majors), the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, has the faculty, resources, and library holdings required to implement the proposed doctoral track in Interdisciplinary Hispanic Studies. This track will allow the U of A to attract and retain BA and MA graduates, and to offer the only terminal degree in the state of Arkansas with concentration in Hispanic Studies. The program will not affect negatively any other program. The proposed track has been consulted with the Spanish Faculty and the chairs of FLAN, HIST, ANTH and they support this proposal.

2. The objective of the second program change proposal is to allow candidates in the translation track to choose from two types of dissertation projects: a) allowing students to focus on a theoretical issue of translation or b) doing a scholarly, annotated book-length translation. These two options will make the program more attractive to students and will contribute to the development of theoretical approaches to translation.

Requirements for the Doctor of Philosophy Degree: The doctoral program in comparative literature and cultural studies is designed so that it may be based upon a Master of Arts in Comparative Literature, Cultural Studies, Communication, Arabic, English, French, German, Spanish or other languages or upon the Master of Fine Arts in Translation. Applicants with masters' degrees in the humanities and the social sciences may also be accepted into the program, but will be required to fulfill any deficiencies that the advisor and the Ph.D. Program Advisory Committee identifies. In addition to meeting hour and distribution requirements in one of the concentrations listed below, during the first year of study, the student must declare which doctoral track they will pursue (comparative literature, modern languages, cultural studies or translation), and select a field, period, or genre specialization to support the dissertation (e.g., the epic tradition, postmodern cinema, Renaissance poetry, theoretical issues in translation). The program of study for each student, including administration of candidacy examinations and the satisfaction of all requirements of the Graduate School, will be designed, approved, and supervised by the Program Advisory Committee, which will consist of the Program Director, who will serve as the primary advisor, and at least two other faculty members drawn from the student's areas of specialization.

The following specific requirements must be met by all Ph.D. degree candidates in Comparative Literature and Cultural Studies:

1. Candidates must take a minimum of 66 hours of graduate course work (including credit taken for the M.A. or M.F.A) and must attain a 3.00 grade-point average in each of their fields. Part or all of the graduate course work completed at other U.S. institutions or abroad with a grade of "B" or higher may count towards the 66 hours requirement with the approval of the Program Advisory Committee. However, it should be noted that this course work will not be reflected on the student's transcript.

2. All candidates are required to take a minimum of 18 dissertation hours.

3. WLIT 5193 Introduction to Comparative Literature is required of all candidates.

4. A literary or cultural theory seminar is required of all candidates.

5. Each Ph.D. degree candidate is required to pass the following candidacy examination:

a. A written examination on specific topics within the student's fields, approved jointly by the student and the Advisory Committee.

b. An oral examination to discuss strengths, weaknesses, or omissions in the written exam. Students may retake only once any examination they fail.

6. Upon successfully completing the candidacy examination, each student must submit a dissertation proposal to be discussed and approved in a formal meeting with the student's dissertation committee.

7. Within the time limits specified by the Graduate School, each student must submit a dissertation acceptable to the student's dissertation committee.

8. Each student must pass a dissertation defense administered by the student's dissertation committee.

Comparative Literature Concentration: A candidate will prepare three literary fields, one of which will be world literature; the others will be drawn from Arabic, English, French, German, Spanish, Classics or other languages. A minimum of 24 hours must be taken in one field, a minimum of 18 in the second, and a minimum of 15 in the third. Courses may be substituted from related fields with program approval. The M.A. will typically be in comparative literature. Each student must demonstrate fluency in at least one language other than English and a reading knowledge of a second foreign language.

Modern Language Concentration: A candidate will prepare two fields, one of which will be English, French, German, or Spanish. The second field may be English (if not selected as the first field) or a second foreign language (Arabic, French, German, or Spanish). The candidate's Master of Arts will typically be in English, French, German, or Spanish. Students with a Master of Arts in these and other languages from other U.S. universities or from programs abroad may also be admitted into the Modern Language Concentration. In such cases, the program committee will evaluate the candidate's academic record, accept part or all of the course work completed elsewhere, and assign any deficiencies that the committee identifies. However, it should be noted that course work taken elsewhere will not be listed on the student's U of A transcript. A minimum of 36 hours must be taken in the first field, a minimum of 24 in the second. Up to 12 hours of relevant world literature or related courses may be applied to either or both fields with program approval. Each student must demonstrate fluency in two languages other than English.

Cultural Studies Concentration: A student will prepare two fields. The first field will be in language and literary studies in a particular tradition (Arabic, Classics, English, French, German, Spanish, or other languages and literatures). The second field of concentration will be developed according to the candidate's interest and disciplinary background, with the approval of the adviser and the doctoral advisory committee. The second field of concentration may be a pre-approved particular cultural studies subject (i.e. gender studies, popular and mass culture, ethnic studies, international film or visual cultures); a geographical region (i.e. Africa, Asia, Latin America, Middle East, Europe); a historical or cultural period (i.e. Medieval, Renaissance, 20th century); or a particular discipline (i.e. Philosophy, Cultural Anthropology, Sociology, Musicology). As core

courses of the second field, COMM 5503 “Communication and Cultural Studies” and the seminar COMM 5993 “ Readings in Cultural Studies” are required. Applicants should have a Master’s of Arts in Comparative Literature, Cultural Studies, English, Foreign Languages or a field in the Humanities or the Social Sciences. A minimum of 30 hours must be taken in each of the two fields. Each student must demonstrate advanced reading competence in at least one language other than English. Literary Translation Concentration: A student will prepare three fields. A minimum of 36 hours will be taken in Arabic, French, German, Spanish or other languages for the first field; a minimum of 9 hours will be taken in translation workshops (ENGL 5043) for the second field; and a minimum of 12 hours drawn from courses on the form and theory of translation, poetry, and fiction (ENGL 5223, ENGL 5263, ENGL 5273, ENGL 5283, ENGL 5293) for the third. Courses may be substituted from related fields with program approval. The M.A. will typically be in Arabic, French, German, Spanish, or other languages and literatures. Each student must demonstrate fluency in at least one language other than English and a reading knowledge of a second foreign language.

PROPOSED TEXT Requirements for the Doctor of Philosophy Degree: The doctoral program in comparative literature and cultural studies is designed so that it may be based upon a Master of Arts in Comparative Literature, Cultural Studies, Communication, Arabic, English, French, German, Spanish or other languages or upon the Master of Fine Arts in Translation. Applicants with masters’ degrees in the humanities and the social sciences may also be accepted into the program, but will be required to fulfill any deficiencies that the advisor and the Ph.D. Program Advisory Committee identifies. In addition to meeting hour and distribution requirements in one of the concentrations listed below, during the first year of study, the student must declare which doctoral track they will pursue (comparative literature, cultural studies, translation, interdisciplinary Hispanic studies, and modern languages), and select a field, period, or genre specialization to support the dissertation (e.g., the epic tradition, postmodern cinema, Renaissance poetry, theoretical issues in translation). The program of study for each student, including administration of candidacy examinations and the satisfaction of all requirements of the Graduate School , will be designed, approved, and supervised by the Program Advisory Committee, which will consist of the Program Director, who will serve as the primary advisor, and at least two other faculty members drawn from the student’s areas of specialization.

The following specific requirements must be met by all Ph.D. degree candidates in Comparative Literature and Cultural Studies:

1. Candidates must take a minimum of 66 hours of graduate course work (including credit taken for the M.A. or M.F.A) and must attain a 3.00 grade-point average in each of their fields. Part or all of the graduate course work completed at other U.S. institutions or abroad with a grade of “B” or higher may count towards the 66 hours requirement with the approval of the Program Advisory Committee. However, it should be noted that this course work will not be reflected on the student’s transcript.
2. All candidates are required to take a minimum of 18 dissertation hours.
3. WLIT 5193 Introduction to Comparative Literature is required of all candidates.
4. A literary or cultural theory seminar is required of all candidates.
5. Each Ph.D. degree candidate is required to pass the following candidacy examination:
 - a. A written examination on specific topics within the student’s fields, approved jointly by the student and the Advisory Committee.
 - b. An oral examination to discuss strengths, weaknesses, or omissions in the written exam. Students may retake only once any examination they fail.
6. Upon successfully completing the candidacy examination, each student must submit a dissertation proposal to be discussed and approved in a formal meeting with the student’s dissertation committee.
7. Within the time limits specified by the Graduate School , each student must submit a dissertation acceptable to the student’s dissertation committee.
8. Each student must pass a dissertation defense administered by the student’s dissertation committee.

Comparative Literature Concentration: A candidate will prepare three literary fields, one of which will be world literature; the others will be drawn from Arabic, English, French, German, Spanish, Classics or other languages. A minimum of 24 hours must be taken in one field, a minimum of 18 in the second, and a minimum of 15 in the third. Courses may be substituted from related fields with program approval. The M.A. will typically be in comparative literature. Each student must demonstrate fluency in at least one language other than English and a reading knowledge of a second foreign language.

Cultural Studies Concentration: A student will prepare two fields. The first field will be in language and literary studies in a particular tradition (Arabic, Classics, English, French, German, Spanish, or other languages and literatures). The second field of concentration will be developed according to the candidate’s interest and disciplinary background, with the approval of the adviser and the doctoral advisory committee. The second field of concentration may be a pre-approved particular cultural studies subject (i.e. gender studies, popular and mass culture, ethnic studies, international film or visual cultures); a geographical region (i.e. Africa , Asia , Latin America , Middle East , Europe); a historical or cultural period (i.e. Medieval, Renaissance, 20th century); or a particular discipline (i.e. Philosophy, Cultural Anthropology, Sociology, Musicology). As core courses of the second field, COMM 5503 “Communication and Cultural Studies” and the seminar COMM 5993 “ Readings in Cultural Studies” are required. Applicants should have a Master’s of Arts in Comparative Literature, Cultural Studies,

English, Foreign Languages or a field in the Humanities or the Social Sciences. A minimum of 30 hours must be taken in each of the two fields. Each student must demonstrate advanced reading competence in at least one language other than English.

Literary Translation Concentration: A student will prepare three fields. A minimum of 36 hours will be taken in Arabic, French, German, Spanish or other languages for the first field; a minimum of 9 hours will be taken in translation workshops (ENGL 5043) for the second field; and a minimum of 12 hours drawn from courses on the form and theory of translation, poetry, and fiction (ENGL 5223, ENGL 5263, ENGL 5273, ENGL 5283, ENGL 5293) for the third. Courses may be substituted from related fields with program approval. The dissertation project may be a study of some translation issue or a book-length translation of a literary work with a critical introduction and annotated text. The M.A. will typically be in Arabic, French, German, Spanish, or other languages and literatures. Each student must demonstrate fluency in at least one language other than English and a reading knowledge of a second foreign language.

Interdisciplinary Hispanic Studies Concentration. This concentration is designed for candidates with an M.A. in Spanish whose scholarly and teaching interests are primarily in Hispanic studies and in interdisciplinary and transnational approaches to the literatures and cultures of Spain, Latin America and Hispanic U.S.. In addition to the general CLCS doctoral requirements, candidates in this concentration will have to complete 51 hours of graduate coursework in Spanish or Hispanic related classes and 9 hours of graduate coursework in one other field, discipline, or language (i.e. Cultural studies, Anthropology, History, English, French, Arabic, etc.). Candidates must be fluent in Spanish and English, and demonstrate reading knowledge of another language.

Modern Language Concentration: A candidate will prepare two fields, one of which will be English, French, German, or Spanish. The second field may be English (if not selected as the first field) or a second foreign language (Arabic, French, German, or Spanish). The candidate's Master of Arts will typically be in English, French, German, or Spanish. Students with a Master of Arts in these and other languages from other U.S. universities or from programs abroad may also be admitted into the Modern Language Concentration. In such cases, the program committee will evaluate the candidate's academic record, accept part or all of the course work completed elsewhere, and assign any deficiencies that the committee identifies. However, it should be noted that course work taken elsewhere will not be listed on the students U of A transcript. A minimum of 36 hours must be taken in the first field, a minimum of 24 in the second. Up to 12 hours of relevant world literature or related courses may be applied to either or both fields with program approval. Each student must demonstrate fluency in two languages other than English.

For example, in the academic year 2005-2006, the Modern Language Association listed 556 teaching positions in Spanish at the college level. With a strong Spanish Bachelor of Arts (100 majors), an interdisciplinary Latin American Studies Program (80 majors), and a nationally competitive Spanish Master of Arts (20 majors), the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, has the faculty, resources, and library holdings required to implement the proposed doctoral track in Interdisciplinary Hispanic Studies. This track will allow the U of A to attract and retain BA and MA graduates, and to offer the only terminal degree in the state of Arkansas with concentration in Hispanic Studies.

The Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences Honors Program seeks to raise the admission and maintenance GPA from 3.25 to 3.5. Currently, Fulbright is the only College on the University of Arkansas campus that has not raised its requirement to at least a 3.5. Moreover, the 3.25 standard has been in place since the inception of Honors Studies in the mid-1950's.

A change will narrow the gap between students who graduate with the minimum marks to receive cum laude distincton and those who must have a 3.8 GPA to receive Magna Cum Laude. A .55 discrpeny leaves significant range and often frustrates students. That is, a student who hovers at the minimum mark of 3.25 will likely graduate with the same honors distinction as a student who has a 3.75 and won a national fellowship.

Finally, such a change will help ensure that professors are working with students who are intent on research and quality scholarship. The proposed change will work to keep the most determined and motivated students in the program while eliminating students who are using the status for early registration or study abroad funding but have no real intent of completing the curriculu.

In May 2006, this proposed change was unanimously approved by the Honors Council, a group of 13 faculty members from Fulbright College.

The concentration is far more restrictive in its requirements than any of the other concentrations, so it is hoped that relaxing the restrictions will make it a more popular degree path. By relaxing the restrictions, we can also return mechanics and electricity and magnetism to their natural order. PHYS 4794 was removed from the option list because the department has decided to stop offering the course. This change should have no effect on other degree programs.

6. Name of proposed unit: College of Education and Health Professions (No name changes are proposed.)
7. Reason for proposed change: Throughout fall semester 2006, a Task Force made up of representatives from each department held meetings to study and recommend a new structure for the College of Education and Health Professions. The proposed changes will facilitate the formation of strategic alliances among programs and allow the College to operate under a more effective and efficient structure. For example, most programs leading to teacher/school administrator will be housed in one department. These changes will result in a reduction of the number of departments from six to five.
8. Provide current and proposed organizational chart.

The following table (Table 1) describes the programs by department under the current organization and the programs by department under the proposed organization. There is also a graphic (Figure 1) showing the current organizational chart and the proposed organizational chart by department.

Three departments, Education Reform (EDRE), Eleanor Mann School of Nursing (NURS) and Health Science, Kinesiology, Recreation and Dance (HKRD), will remain unchanged.

The Department of Curriculum and Instruction (CIED) will house all PK-12 teacher/school administrator-related programs, with the exception of Art, Agriculture, and Music Education, which are offered in other colleges, and Kinesiology K-12, which is housed across campus and whose faculty also teach in non-teacher licensure concentrations.

The B.S.E. in Career and Technical Education - CATE degree (recently renamed) with teacher education concentrations will be split out and moved from the Department of Rehabilitation, Human Resources and Communications (RHRC) to the Department of Curriculum and Instruction (CIED). The remaining (non-teacher licensure) B.S.E. in Human Resource Development will be renamed as a program and will remain in RHRC. A Letter of Notification asking for this change is currently in the approval chain. Educational Technology (ETEC) and Education Foundations (EDFD) programs will be moved from Educational Leadership, Counseling and Foundations (ELCF) to Curriculum and Instruction (CIED) since many of their courses support NCATE accredited programs.

Counseling (CNED) and Higher Education (HIED) programs will move to the Department of Rehabilitation, Human Resources and Communications Disorders (RHRC), where related programs in Rehabilitation Counseling (RHAB), Communication Disorders (CDIS) and Workforce Development (WDED) programs are located.

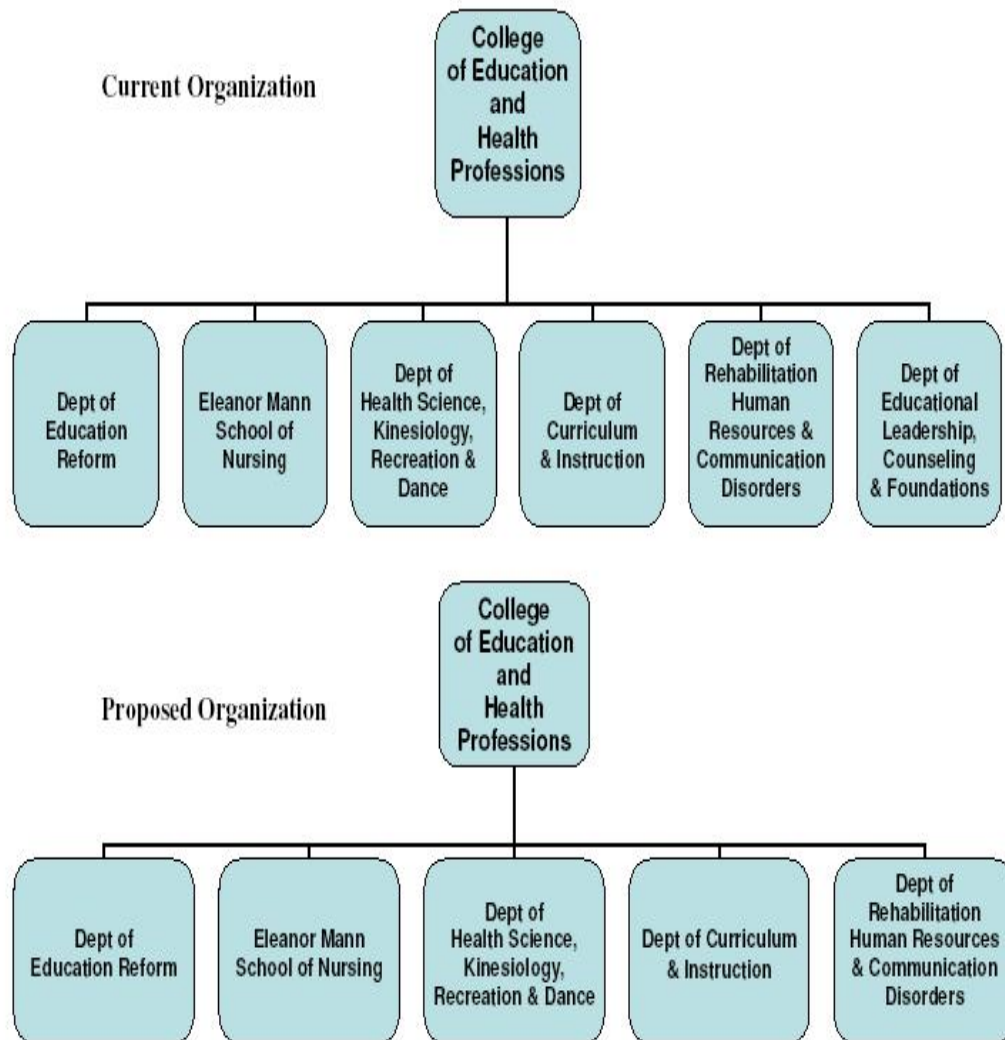
