Changing the course title of HESC 1201 from Intro. to Dietetics & Nutrition to Intro. to the Dietetics Profession will alleviate confusion on the part of students who have registered for the course as an elective with the misperception that it was a nutrition course.

The addition of both HESC 2203 Nutrition for Exercise & Sport and FDSC 2503 Food Safety & Sanitation will strengthen the content of the Dietetics program.

HESC 3604 Fd. Prep. Hosp. Industry title was changed in Fall 2010 to Menu, Layout, & Food Prep.

The proposed change to the TURF minor allows for the addition of a recently developed turf management course (HORT 4913) and now requires students to complete 3 turf management courses instead of two. The soil science (CSES 2203/2201L) requirement has been dropped since many prospective students needed to take a chemistry course as a prerequisite for CSES 2203/2201L, which ultimately requires an additional 4 hours to complete the minor. CSES 2203/2201L is still included as an elective in the proposed minor. Also, to allow students more flexibility in completing the minor, the AGME requirement (3 hr) was dropped; however the AGME courses may still be counted as minor electives in the proposed minor. The physics and engineering programs, the primary majors impacted by students presenting AP Physics C credit, both currently offer credit for the AP Physics C exams. The AP Physics C exams have implemented significant experimental design questions, and are graded such that it is quite difficult to achieve a 5 on the exam without doing well on that type of problem. A more extensive experience in experimental design is the primary difference between honors and regular university physics classes. Students who receive a 5 on those exams have demonstrated an in-depth grasp of the subject matter and experimental design, so should receive honors credit. The university has been working on an NSF funded project (College Ready in Mathematics and Physics) to improve the quality of Advanced Placement instruction in physics and mathematics in 42 school districts in Arkansas and Oklahoma. It is not unusual for a 5 on an AP exam to grant honors or higher level credit than a 4. The physics department believes the fact that it does not in PHYS 2054 or 2074 to be an earlier oversight.

The Department of Curriculum and Instruction offers programs that prepare candidates for initial teacher licensure in Childhood Education. The

B.S.E. degree in Childhood Education is not an initial teacher licensure program but instead leads to the Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.), which is the initial teacher licensure preparation program. Information about the M.A.T. degree program can be found in the University of Arkansas Graduate Catalog.

Candidates seeking entry into the Childhood Education program will be advised in the Boyer Center for Student Services until admission to the junior year of the program, at which time they will be assigned a faculty adviser.

Admission to the B.S.E. in Childhood Education is limited competitive and consists of a three-stage process.

Stage I: Pre-Childhood Education (PCHED)

1. Complete all program pre-requisites including the first 62 or 63 hours of the 8-semester plan (see 8-semester table below)
2. Obtain a minimum of 2.7 GPA on the 62 or 63 hours of pre-requisite courses, either from the UA or on transfer coursework. UA coursework.
3. Complete the following courses with a "C" or better: CIED 3023, CIED 3033, COMM 1313, MATH 1203 or equivalent, ENGL 1013, and ENGL 1023.
4. Obtain a passing score on the Math, Reading, and Writing sections of the Praxis I.

Stage II: Admission to the Childhood Education Program (CHED)

Admission to the Childhood Education Program is competitive and occurs after completion of all Pre-Childhood Education requirements and prior to the beginning of

the fall semester of the junior year. Not all applicants meeting the minimum requirements will be admitted to the program. Applications to the Childhood Education (CHED) program must be submitted by January 30. At this point applicants must decide which program option they will follow; either CHED BSE leading to MAT option or ELEL BSE licensure option. Both of these options are described on the application which can be found on the College of Education and Health Professions website at <http://cied.uark.edu/2360.htm>.

The application process includes:

1. Submission of Childhood Education application.
2. Submission of transcripts for all coursework.
3. Oral Interview.
4. Submission of Writing and Editing Samples.
5. Submission of passing score on Math, Reading, and Writing sections of Praxis I Exam.

Stage III: Requirements for Progression to Senior Coursework Program Continuation.

1. Declaration of endorsement area of ESL or SPED.
2. Maintain a cumulative GPA of 2.7.
3. All non-methods math, science, social studies and HESC courses as well as CIED 3003/3001, CIED 3023, CIED 3033, and CIED 3263 must be completed prior to senior year.

Master of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.)

The Masters of Arts in Teaching (M.A.T.) is the degree that leads to initial teacher licensure. This is a graduate program and applicants must meet the admission requirements of the Graduate School. Applicants must have completed all requirements for the B.S.E. by the end of spring semester to be considered for admission into the M.A.T., which is a year-long field-based degree that starts during the summer prior to the regular fall-spring academic year.

M.A.T. candidates will be advised by faculty advisers.

Admission requirements:

1. Admission to the University of Arkansas Graduate School.
2. Submission of M.A.T. Application.
3. Cumulative GPA of 3.0 on the last 60 hours of coursework. Including any transfer work or grade forgiveness.
4. Passing score on Praxis II, Early Childhood: Content Knowledge (10022).
5. Passing score on M.A.T. entrance portfolio.

6. Successful interview with M.A.T. admission committee.

NOTE: Requirements for teacher licensure vary from state to state and may differ from teacher preparation programs. Please note that Arkansas requires all applicants to successfully complete a criminal background check. 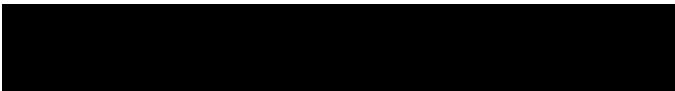

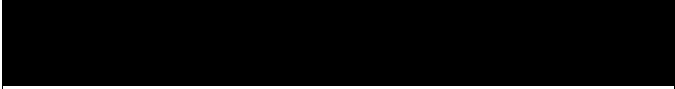

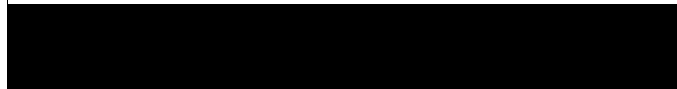

This new major would replace the Adult Education concentration within the M.Ed. degree in Workforce Development Education. The establishment of the Adult and Lifelong Learning major is in response to the issues that were identified during the academic review of the Workforce Development Education program during spring 2010. The recommendation of the external reviewers was to develop a discernable adult education curriculum. The program faculty reviewed the current adult education course offerings and felt that it was necessary to establish a new academic program in order to address the issues within the current program as noted by the external reviewers.

Newly admitted students would enter the Adult and Lifelong Learning program beginning fall 2011. Current students enrolled in the adult education concentration in the Workforce Development Education program would be given the option to transfer to the new program, or complete their degree in the existing program. The existing adult education concentration in Workforce Development Education would be eliminated.

Students pursuing the M.Ed. degree may also pursue Adult Education licensure in order to serve as adult education instructors at state-approved adult education and literacy programs.

There are no anticipated additional costs and current faculty appointments will be sufficient to operate the program. No additional library resources will be required.

Master of Education Courses

ADLL 5113 - Perspectives in Adult Education - Historical overview of the evolving field of adult education and lifelong learning in the U.S. Course covers seminal and emerging theorists in the field, roles and responsibilities of adult education providers and reviews the expansion of adult and lifelong learning opportunities associated with societal and demographic shifts.

- Analyze the importance of adult education to the individual and society.
- Explore the need for adult education at the state, nation, and international level.
- Identify issues relative to major providers and program areas, including those which serve multicultural and diverse clientele.
- Examine major and seminal adult education theorists and their contributions to the field.
- Compare and contrast adult education with other forms of education.

ADLL 5123 - Principles and Practices of Adult Learning - Overview of the adult learner including characteristics, motivation for participating in learning, and strategies for developing educational programs for diverse adult populations.

- Describe the characteristics of adult learners.
- Discuss factors affecting motivation for learning among adults in various learning settings.
- Identify and discuss strategies for developing learning programs for adults.
- Analyze, compare, and contrast different adult learning theories.
- Differentiate between the use of various adult learning theories for diverse adult populations.

ADLL 5133 - Curriculum Development in ABE and ASE - Curriculum development in Adult Basic Education and Adult Secondary Education settings including the various educational functioning levels, measures to assess student levels, selection of teaching materials, and development of curriculum utilizing instructional standards for ABE and ASE programs.

- Discuss the need and role of ABE and ASE programs in U.S. Society.
- Utilize appropriate assessments to determine a student's educational functioning level (EFL) in ABE and ASE settings.
- Evaluate and select appropriate teaching materials for use in ABE and ASE settings.
- Apply appropriate classroom management and teaching techniques such as lecture, group discussion, and peer learning when teaching adults in ABE and ASE settings.
- Design and teach lessons in ABE and ASE settings.

ADLL 5143 - Instructional Strategies and Assessment in Adult Education – Selection and utilization of materials and instructional methods for use in adult learning settings. Evaluative strategies to develop or select appropriate tools and techniques predicated upon the needs and goals of adult learners.

- Identify and evaluate teaching skills appropriate in adult and lifelong learning settings.
- Select and critique research that relates to adult and lifelong learning teaching practice.
- Select and evaluate materials for use in adult and lifelong learning contexts.
- Assess learner needs based upon students skills and abilities.

- Develop learning plans based upon the needs and goals of adult learners.

ADLL 5153 - Organization and Administration of Adult and Lifelong Learning Programs - Legal, ethical, staffing, and financial considerations for the development and implementation of programs for adult and lifelong learners in various programs including literacy centers, GED centers, community education, lifelong/leisure learning, and postsecondary education.

- Explain the roles and responsibilities of an instructional leader in adult and lifelong learning.
- Explore legal and ethical issues related to supervision of instructional and support staff.
- Discuss the practices and procedures for evaluating instructional and support staff.
- Create a financial plan for sustaining an adult education or lifelong learning program.

ADLL 5163 - Managing Change in Adult and Lifelong Learning - Strategies for planning, organizing, and facilitating change in programs that serve adult learners from diverse populations, across varied developmental stages and geographic locations. Discussion of social change that has impacted adult education and analysis of change models relevant to individuals, groups and organizations.

- Describe the process of change, and the adult educator's role as an agent of change.
- Justify the need for change at the individual, organization, and societal level.
- Apply conceptual and theoretical models to the change process.
- Identify and discuss significant research regarding the effect of change on individuals.
- Identify and evaluate elements of social change which have affected adults

ADLL 5173 - Program Planning – Program development process for adult and lifelong learners. Overview of assessment, stakeholder buy-in, developing program objectives, formative and summative evaluation, budgeting, and scheduling processes.

- Explain the role of planning programs in adult and lifelong learning settings.
- Differentiate program needs of adults in multicultural and diverse settings.
- Identify appropriate learning objectives relative to different types of programs for adult learners.
- Determine the resources necessary to implement a program in an adult and lifelong setting.
- Design a program plan for an adult and lifelong learning setting.

ADLL 5183 - Technology and Innovation in Adult Learning - Techniques for designing, developing, implementing, and assessing technology-mediated adult and lifelong learning programs. Discussion of issues relevant to the use of innovative strategies for delivering instruction via emerging technologies and their potential impact on content and learning outcomes.

- Identify and describe the types of technology which are appropriate for use in adult and lifelong learning settings.
- Review current research regarding the effectiveness of technology-mediated instruction in adult and lifelong learning settings.
- Interpret and apply policies pertaining to the use of technology (i.e. distance education) in adult and lifelong programs.

- Select technologies which incorporate universal design which addresses learning disabilities and differences for adults from special populations.
- Discuss and examine critical issues that influence the use of technology in adult and lifelong learning.
- Create a technology plan for an adult and lifelong learning setting.

ADLL 5193 - Seminar in Adult and Lifelong Learning – Seminars focused on topics related to adult and lifelong learning. Sub topics:

- Grant writing
- Management in community and nonprofit agencies
- Adult literacy and numeracy
- Adult ESL and family literacy
- Programs for adults with disabilities

ADLL 5213 - Adult and Lifelong Learning Internship - Internship in adult and lifelong learning settings.

ADLL 5223 - Applied Project – Development and implementation of a project focused on adult and lifelong learning. Consent of advisor/instructor required.

- Identify a problem or an issue that exists within an adult education or lifelong learning setting.
- Research interventions which have been used previously to address similar issues in adult education or lifelong learning settings.
- Develop a plan to address the problem or issue within the adult education or lifelong learning setting.
- Support the components of the plan which are designed to address the problem or issue.

Doctor of Education Courses

ADLL 6413 - Quantitative Reasoning in Adult and Lifelong Learning - Methodologies for designing descriptive, correlational, and experimental studies. Development of research questions, definition of variables, selection or development of instruments, data collection, analysis, interpretation and reporting of research results.

- Discuss theoretical perspectives and orientations associated with quantitative paradigm.
- Identify accepted elements of quantitative research design.
- Discuss and differentiate the differences among the types of quantitative studies including descriptive, correlation, and experimental.
- Formulate research question appropriate quantitative research design.
- Evaluate data collection instruments associated with quantitative research questions.
- Analyze quantitative data using appropriate statistical techniques.
- Report research results using appropriate data display techniques.

ADLL 6423 - Qualitative Reasoning in Adult and Lifelong Learning - Methodologies for designing qualitative research studies in adult and lifelong learning settings. Selection of the appropriate qualitative tradition, selection of research subjects, development of data collection protocols, field work strategies, data analysis, data interpretation and presentation of data results.

- Discuss theoretical perspectives and orientations associated with the qualitative paradigm.
- Identify accepted elements of quantitative research design
- Discuss and differentiate among the five major types of qualitative research
- Formulate research question appropriate for qualitative research design
- Develop a data collection protocol (i.e. interviews, observations, document analysis) acceptable for use in qualitative research settings.
- Analyze qualitative data using appropriate coding strategies.
- Report research results using appropriate data display techniques

ADLL 6433 - Program Evaluation - Overview of evaluation strategies in adult and lifelong learning programs that include: development of evaluation questions, selection or development of instrumentation, data collection methods, data analysis, and reporting of evaluation results. Emphasis on practical and ethical issues associated with evaluation processes.

- Describe and explain differences between program evaluation and educational research.
- Explore various evaluation models germane to diverse populations
- Determine evaluation methodology or instrumentation for evaluating programs across diverse contexts and populations
- Implement evaluation of an adult and lifelong learning program and issue a report of evaluation findings to the program stakeholders.

ADLL 6443 - Adult and Lifelong Learning Dissertation Seminar - Development of dissertation proposal. Formation of research question, selection of methodologies, development of problem statement, research questions, and identification of research variables, constructs of phenomena. Identification of data collection and data analysis procedures.

- Develop, articulate, and justify significance of a research topic appropriate for dissertation proposal
- Design a research strategy using questions or objectives as research guide
- Identify an appropriate theoretical framework which grounds dissertation research.
- Describe site and sample selection for their research
- Describe instrumentation procedures for their research.
- Outline, explain, and defend data collection methods for their research.

ADLL 6113 - Advanced Adult Learning Theory – Advanced study of theories and models of adult and lifelong learning with an emphasis on current trends, recent research, and issues affecting the field. Issues covered will include critical theory and advancements in neuroscience and cognition as they relate to adult learning and lifespan development.

- Compare and contrast the contributions of seminal adult education theorists.
- Discuss and analyze critical theory of adult education.
- Evaluate theories and strategies for developing adult learning programs based upon recently published empirical studies.
- Demonstrate how emerging interdisciplinary research (i.e. neuroscience, lifespan development) informs the practice of adult education and how it supports/refutes the contributions of major theorists.

ADLL 6123 - Leadership and Ethics in Adult and Lifelong Learning - This doctoral course focuses on leadership principles and ethical considerations that are critical to developing and sustaining adult education programs that benefit individuals, organizations, and communities. Course content will include case study analysis and lectures from scholar-practitioners from the field.

- Identify and explain personal leadership assumptions and philosophy
- Analyze socio-political and cultural complexities of decision-making and ethical leadership
- Explore and discuss the systemic elements of leadership and change
- Assimilate adaptive leadership framework into practice

ADLL 6133 - Analysis of International Adult and Lifelong Programs – Survey of the historical and philosophical events which have shaped adult and lifelong learning worldwide. Discussion of issues affecting adult education and lifelong learning including globalization, educational access, and variance in national policies.

- Explain the impact of historical and philosophical events which have affected adult and lifelong learning.
- Distinguish how adult and lifelong learning practices differ based upon a nation's political structure, economy, and cultural norms.
- Describe and explain the affect of United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) and the World Bank on adult and lifelong learning practice.
- Examine how adult education and lifelong learning practices are effected by globalization, the market economy, environment, and health.
- Identify and explain how adult and lifelong learning programs assist marginalized populations and lead to community empowerment.

ADLL 6143 - Instructional Adaptation and Innovation in Adult and Lifelong Learning – An overview of teaching and learning methods, styles, and techniques which are applicable when facilitating adult learners across diverse settings. Content to include teaching and learning style assessment, accommodating learning styles, physical and learning disabilities, language differences and cultural norms.

- Identify and describe different systems of teaching and learning styles.
- Explain how different teaching and learning styles can be applied to adult and lifelong learning settings.
- Identify appropriate teaching styles which address needs for adult learners with physical or learning disabilities.
- Describe the influence of language differences and cultural norms on an adult learner's ability to process and understand.
- Demonstrate the ability to assess an adult student's learning style.

ADLL 6153 - Policy and Public Governance of Adult and Lifelong Learning Programs – Policy analysis and public governance issues in adult and lifelong learning with emphasis on state and federal programs. Discussions of how to evaluate, design, and implement policy focused on promoting adult and lifelong learning activities in a myriad of organizations. Overview of trends and current issues related to policy and public governance of adult and lifelong learning.

- Examine current state and federal policy and law regarding adult and lifelong learning initiatives.
- Evaluate how federal policy informs practice at the state level and how state level policy informs practice at the local program level.
- Consider policy changes needed to enhance the accessibility and sustainability of public adult and lifelong learning programs.
- Review recent empirical research which should be considered when developing policy related to adult and lifelong learning programs. Develop recommendations to apply those research findings to practice.

ADLL 6163 - Adult Development and Psychology – Focus on adult developmental psychology with emphasis on lifespan development and specific issues related to learning in the various stages of adulthood. Work-life balance, meaning of work, generational issues.

- Describe adult development and the major themes of adulthood from the psychosocial, sociological, biological and cognitive perspectives.
- Examine the importance of life stages and aging issues as they relate to adults' personal and professional lives.
- Analyze the effects of the aging process and lifespan development on cognitive processes and learning.
- Explore the effects of life transitions and the maturation process as they relate to adult learners' needs and objectives.
- Apply the theories of adult development and current research to practice in an adult learning setting.

ADLL 6173 - Current Issues - Exploration and discussion of current issues relative to adult education and lifelong learning. Focus on the review and application of current research as it relates to practice. May be repeated twice.

ADLL 6313 - Independent Study - Independent study of topics in adult and lifelong learning.

ADLL 700V - Dissertation Research.
