To expose students to religious, philosophical, historical, and cultural approaches to Judaism and Jewish thought, and the role of Judaism and Jewish thought in the current, multicultural world; to prepare students for thoughtful engagement with important problems and academic questions regarding history, international politics, cultural studies, law, business, literature, and the arts involving both Israeli and diaspora Jewish life and experience; to prepare students for the critical and culturally savvy thinking needed for careers in business, law, education, the arts, humanities, or sciences; to prepare students for post-graduate work in politics, philosophy, religion, literature, languages, history, arts, sociology, or anthropology that engages with the complex questions of multiculturalism, minority literatures, religion, identity, genocide, hermeneutics, and time that emerge in the study of Judaism and Jewish cultures.

Students acquire the intellectual tools to engage in more advanced study of Judaism after completing the minor. Students have a firm grasp of the basic tenets of Judaism, the facts of Jewish life, and the key questions and debates in Jewish history and thought, and can apply them in historical, literary, political, sociological, philosophical, legal, business, and educational contexts. Students have a nuanced understanding of new perspectives Jewish thought can bring. Students have the tools to develop informed positions on wide-ranging issues in history and in the modern world. Students are better prepared to navigate a diverse, multicultural world.
