Journalism proposes to add Media Ethics (JOUR 4333) as a required course in the journalism core, to be taken by all majors in the department. The reasons for this action follow:

1. Ethics study would round out the core training journalism students receive in correct grammatical style, writing, media's role in society, and law.
2. The ethics course is more effective in increasing students' awareness of the ethical responsibilities of media professionals than the piecemeal approach of incorporating a brief focus on ethics into various courses.
3. The ethics course makes students aware of the range of problems facing journalists and the difficulties in resolving them.
4. The ethics course enrollment mixes students from all sequences in journalism so there is "cross-learning" about the different challenges facing news reporters in print, broadcast, and photography, and professionals in advertising and public relations.
5. This change has no effect on any other degree program in Fulbright College or at the University of Arkansas.
