Program Goals and Objectives

Program Goals and Objectives

The baccalaureate program in Criminology is designed to prepare individuals to understand and analyze the social causes, correlates, and implications of criminal behavior, the legal system, and the modes of social control. Hence, of particular importance to the criminology undergraduate program are the following general goals, which draw upon a strong base in the social sciences:

1. to provide intellectual and practical tools to examine and make sense of processes and issues relating to criminal behavior, the victims of crime, social control, and the needs of a broader society;
2. to provide habits of thought and investigation useful in later life;
3. to encourage exploration and development of ethical values; and
4. to provide the necessary foundation for professional competence or further training in professional or graduate schools.

Learning Outcomes

Learning Outcomes

By graduation, students with the B.A. Degree in Criminology should be able to:

1. effectively use critical thinking, to include the ability to analyze arguments, to understand theoretical and ideological assumptions that underlie different arguments; to create and defend a coherent argument;
2. effectively use communication skills in writing, to include the ability to clearly communicate both description and analysis; how to present original ideas and the work of others;

Learning Outcomes

3. effectively use data as well as problem solving skills to conceptualize problems and to engage in effective reasoning and decision making;

In addition, students with the B.A. Degree in Criminology should have acquired the more specific set of skills:

1. an understanding of theories of crime, offender typologies, and victimology.

2. an understanding of the methodological foundations for conducting criminological research, to include the ability to understand and analyze qualitative and quantitative data;

3. knowledge of the various modes of social control, including the main forces of social control (e.g., criminal law, police, courts and corrections), and how the different modes of social control affect and are affected by the larger society;

4. knowledge necessary to become informed consumers of criminological research

5. an understanding diversity and inequality issues related to crime, victimization, incarceration, and the overall operation of the criminal justice system

Description and justification of the request

Description of specific change	Justification for this change
1. We are removing CRIM 3043 and CRIM 3203 from the list of required courses and adding SOCI 3193.	The BA in Criminology is designed to expose students to social science research and prepare them to engage in critical thinking with the emphasis on how social inequalities (e.g., race, class and gender) affect people's lives, and especially their interactions with the criminal justice system. These critical thinking and research skills will prepare students for careers in criminological research and policy-making in the increasingly diverse world.
2. We are changing the number of elective hours from 12 to 15 and changing the language to: 15 hours of criminology courses not taken above, 6 hours of which must be sociology or cross-listed.	The proposed changes decrease the number of required classes allowing students more flexibility in selecting the elective courses that appeal to them, expand on their interests, and allow for a more well-rounded intellectual growth.
