To create an intellectual environment that challenges the best of students, the J. William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences provides a comprehensive program of honors studies. This includes the College Honors Program, a four-year interdisciplinary honors program for students of superior academic ability or artistic talent, and the Departmental Honors Program, an honors program emphasizing directed independent study within a department or discipline of the college.

For admission into the Fulbright College Honors Program, an incoming student must have at least a 3.75 high school grade point average and a minimum ACT composite score of 28 or 1310 **SAT. A current Fulbright College student must have completed two regular semesters with minimum full-time enrollment of 12 hours per semester on the University of Arkansas-Fayetteville campus and have earned a cumulative GPA 3.50 or higher. SAT-Transfer students who arrive at the University of Arkansas with a 3.50 GPA from their previous institution are welcome to apply for admission to the Fulbright Honors Program after having completed one regular semester with minimum full-time enrollment of 12 hours on the University of Arkansas-Fayetteville campus while retaining a cumulative 3.50 GPA.**

~~A current Fulbright College student must have a University of Arkansas grade point average of 3.5 or above and a faculty recommendation from the department of study.~~

A student who successfully completes a program of honors studies within Fulbright College is eligible to receive a baccalaureate degree with the distinction College Scholar *cum laude*, or Departmental Scholar *cum laude* in the major field of study. Higher distinctions of *magna cum laude* or *summa cum laude* may be awarded to outstanding honors students by recommendation of the Fulbright College Honors Council.

To earn the distinction Fulbright College Scholar *cum laude* at graduation, a student must successfully complete the honors core curriculum, maintain a minimum grade-point average of 3.5, and satisfy requirements for departmental honors in the major field of study, including preparation and oral defense of an honors thesis. The Honors Council may award the higher distinctions of *magna cum laude* or *summa cum laude* based upon a student's total academic performance, including the academic transcript, the quality of the scholarly activity pursued within the major field of study, and the breadth of college study as a whole.

To earn the distinction of Departmental Scholar *cum laude* at graduation, a student must successfully complete requirements prescribed by the major department, including an honors thesis and oral examination, maintain a minimum grade-point average of 3.5, and take 12 hours (which may include six hours of thesis) in honors studies. If a student demonstrates superior academic performance or an exceptionally high level of scholarly activity, the Honors Council may award the distinction of *magna cum laude*. In exceptional instances where truly outstanding work within the major field is coupled with the superior understanding of its relationship to the college work as a whole, the distinction *summa cum laude* may be awarded. The minimum number of honors hours required for each level of distinction must be completed in residence.

Fulbright Honors Academic Integrity Policy

All Fulbright Honors students are held to the highest standard with regard to academic achievement and academic integrity. Any student violating the Academic Integrity Policy who receives a sanction of 1.0 or more (two 0.5 sanctions or a one-time sanction of 1.0 or more) at the University of Arkansas will be permanently removed from the Fulbright Honors Program. The student may petition for grade forgiveness and to have the X sanction removed from their transcript. If both are achieved, the student may apply for re-admission into the Fulbright Honors Program. Any student suspended or expelled due to dishonesty will be permanently removed from Honors and will be denied the opportunity to reapply.

Degrees with Honors

The J. William Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences is dedicated to providing students a liberal education in the arts, humanities, and sciences. Such an education should be soundly based, innovative, and enriched by a creative faculty. This is especially true for students with superior academic ability or artistic talent. To achieve these aims, the college faculty has developed and participates in the College Honors Program and the Departmental Honors Program.

Requirements for the College Honors Program: Credit or exemption for University Core in English composition, including [ENGL 1013](#) and [ENGL 1023](#), and in American history or American government, completion of the requirements for honors in a department or study area of the college, including preparation and oral defense of an honors thesis, a cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 or above, and completion of the honors core curriculum. Students who do not have at least a 3.5 GPA will not be allowed to graduate with honors.

Requirements for the Departmental Honors Program: Specific academic requirements including course work, participation in departmental honors colloquia or seminars, and independent study projects are established by the faculty of the individual departments or study areas and are approved by the Honors Council. However, all departmental honors students must have a 3.5 cumulative grade-point average, complete and defend an honors thesis, and take 12 hours (which may include six hours of thesis) in Honors Studies. Information concerning these requirements is given within each department's catalog listings.

The minimum academic requirements of the honors core curriculum for the B.A./B.S.W., B.S., B.M., and B.F.A. degree programs can be found in the degree requirements for each program listed below.

Description of specific change	Justification for this change
Added more honors core course options to keep more in line with the University Core.	In 2009 when the Fulbright College core changed nothing was added to what FCHP had previously offered as options. The only courses included were those that could be taken at the honors level as ALL honors core was previously required to be taken as honors. Now we believe that students should be able to choose from other state approved core options as well as what was already on our lists. For this reason we are asking that they be added to our core as well.

Description of specific change	Justification for this change
Modified our process for accepting current/transfer students into departmental honors.	At present, current students only need 1 semester at 3.5 GPA in order to be able to petition for admission. Our program would like to see a 2-semester track record before we admit students into the honors program. Two semesters at 3.5 demonstrates a more accurate history of success (maintaining the 3.5 in college coursework), which is what the student will need to remain in Honors, anyway. The admission for transfer students remains the same (they may apply after 1 semester); here, we just wanted to clarify that they need to have a 3.5 overall GPA from the institution from which they are transferring. The Honors Council voted and overwhelmingly supports this change.
Modified the stipulation for honors colloquia for College Honors students.	We still want to require 9 hours, but while we have plenty of Social Science and Humanities colloquia to choose from, there are simply not enough Natural Sciences Colloquia being offered by Fulbright faculty. We will still require 9 hours but want to introduce more flexibility, hence 9 hours from at least two of those three categories. That way, College Honors students can graduate with honors, on time.
