Terry Martin called the meeting to order at 2:37P.M.

1. The minutes for the March 19, 2010 meeting were approved.

2. Course Change Proposals:

One course was pulled from Tables A and C, HESC 4673 - Destination Marking & Operations, the course was withdrawn from consideration by Tim Killian. The course is to be killed.

- A. The remaining Undergraduate and School of Law course change proposals (<u>Tables A & D</u>) were approved without opposition and will be forwarded for the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.
- B. Graduate and Dual course change proposals (<u>Tables B & C</u>) were approved without opposition and will be forwarded for the May Graduate Council meeting.

3. Old Business:

Response to the University General Education Core Curriculum Committee concerning the proposed diversity requirement was drafted by Chuck Adams who forwarded a second draft for consideration. Chuck was unable to attend the meeting. The response document was discussed and several changes were passed which were documented in the document "Response Document (1)". The final document without changes being tracked is presented as "Final Response Document" and was forwarded to the University General Education Core Curriculum

Committee with a copy being forwarded to Dr. Nancy Talburt, Neil Allison, Ro DiBrezzo and David Gay.

4. New Business:

- A. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Bumpers College of Agriculture, Food and Life Sciences, Department of Animal Science ANSCBS BSA, Animal Science (<u>Table 1, Attachment 1A</u>) was presented by Donna Graham. The program change requested to allow students to fulfill the Chemistry requirement with either CHEM1074/1071L or CHEM 1123/1121L and allow the organic chemistry requirement to be met with either CHEM 2613/2611 or CHEM3603/3601L. The proposal was approved without opposition and will be forwarded for consideration at the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.
- B. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Arts and Sciences Dean RLST-M Minor, Religious Studies (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2A</u>) was presented by Donna Draper. The proposal requested to eliminate 14 courses and add 8 courses to the elective course listing, change several program requirements as well as the program mission statement. The proposal was approved without opposition and will be forwarded for consideration at the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.
- C. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Anthropology ANTHBA BA, Anthropology (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2B</u>, <u>Attachment 2C</u>, <u>Attachment 2D</u>, <u>Attachment 2E</u>) was presented by <u>Mary Joe Schneider</u>. The proposal requested to increase the required hours for the major from 30 to 35 and add three new specializations Archeology, Biological Anthropology and Cultural Anthropology. After considerable discussion the proposal was tabled until the May UCPC meeting.
- D. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Anthropology – ANTHBS – BS, Anthropology (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2F</u> and <u>Attachment 2G</u>) was presented by **Mary Joe Schneider**. The proposal requested to add a new program. After considerable discussion the proposal was tabled until the May UCPC meeting.
- E. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Biology – BIOLBA – BA, Biology (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2H</u> and <u>Attachment 2I</u>) was presented by **Donna Draper**. The proposal requested eight major changes to the curriculum. After considerable discussion the proposal was tabled until the May UCPC meeting.
- F. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Biology BIOLBS BS, Biology (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2J</u> and <u>Attachment 2J</u>) was presented by **Donna Draper**. The proposal requested to eliminate BIOL 2001,

Bibliographic Practicum, and a three hour Philosophy course is being added from the following list; PHIL 2103, PHIL 2203, PHIL 3113 or PHIL 4213. For clarification, upper level lab courses are being defined to include BIOL 399VH, BIOL 480V, BIOL 480VH, BIOL 499V and BIOL 499VH. After considerable discussion the proposal was tabled until the May UCPC meeting.

- G. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Biology BIOL-M Minor in Biology (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2L</u>) was presented by **Donna Draper**. The proposal requested to require three biology core courses and two BIOL electives as outlined in the requirements for a BA degree in biology and a fourth biology course may be selected as one to the electives. After considerable discussion the proposal was tabled until the May UCPC meeting.
- H. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Biology MSCIBA BA, Medical Sciences (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2M</u> and <u>Attachment 2N</u>) was presented by **Donna Draper**. The proposal requested to eliminate the program. The proposal was approved without opposition and will be forwarded for consideration at the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.
- I. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Drama DRAMBA BA, Drama (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 20</u>) was presented by **Donna Draper**. The proposal requested to add DRAM 1003 or DRAM 1003H as alternatives for DRAM 1223 and add DRAM 3943, Scene Painting, as an additional elective course. The proposal was approved without opposition and will be forwarded for consideration at the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.
- J. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of Drama DRAM-M Minor in Drama (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2P</u>) was presented by **Donna Draper**. The proposal requested to add DRAM 1003 or DRAM 1003H as alternatives for DRAM1223. The proposal was approved without opposition and will be forwarded for consideration at the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.
- K. Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of English University Requirement of Advanced English (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2Q</u>) was presented by **Joe Candido**. The proposal requested to eliminate the Advanced English requirement from the University requirements for graduation. The proposal was approved without opposition and will be forwarded for consideration at the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.

Proposed undergraduate program change for the Fulbright College of Arts and Sciences, Department of World Languages, Literatures and Cultures – CHBO-M – Minor in Chinese with Business Orientation (<u>Table 2</u>, <u>Attachment 2R</u> and <u>Attachment 2S</u>) was presented by **Jenny Xu**. The proposal requested to add a new minor in Chinese with Business

- Orientation. The proposal was approved without opposition and will be forwarded for consideration at the May 5, 2010 Faculty Senate meeting.

The UCPC applauds the efforts of the University Core Curriculum Committee to establish a diversity requirement, but wishes to express its strong opposition to the current proposal.

- The curricula of several colleges (specifically Walton College, the College of Engineering, and the
 Jones School of Architecture) prescribe in detail their students' path toward a degree, making an
 additional university requirement very difficult to integrate into degree plans without delaying
 graduation.
- The current proposal contains no provision for support for those departments offering the courses listed. Enrollment increases can be expected in all these courses if the proposal is passed, and some will experience significant enrollment growth, although it is unclear how increases in particular courses can be predicted. Unless the proposal is accompanied by a specific commitment by the Provost to provide adequate resources to Fulbright College to meet these enrollment pressures, the plan will impose a severe strain on several Fulbrightany department offering diversity courses departments.
- Many of the courses listed are inappropriate for a general education requirement, such as
 colloquia or other upper-division courses which depend on an advanced level of student
 preparation and small maximum class sizes for their success. Others, such as General Sociology,
 are designed for purposes too broad to satisfy the apparent intention of the diversity
 requirement.

The UCPC respectfully requests that the UCCC reconsider the proposal in light of these objections, and consider allowing each college to develop its own curricula to fulfill this requirement.

Moved:

The University Course and Programs Committee (UCPC) applauds the efforts of the General Education Core Curriculum Committee to establish a diversity requirement, but wishes to express its strong opposition to the current proposal.

- The current proposal contains no provision for support for those departments offering the courses listed. Enrollment increases can be expected in all these courses if the proposal is passed, and some will experience significant enrollment growth, although it is unclear how increases in particular courses can be predicted. Unless the proposal is accompanied by a specific commitment by the Provost to provide adequate resources to meet these enrollment pressures, the plan will impose a severe strain on departments offering diversity courses.
- Many of the courses listed are inappropriate for a general education requirement, such as

The UCPC respectfully requests that the General Education Core Curriculum Committee reconsider the proposal in light of these objections, and consider allowing each college to develop its own curricula to fulfill the diversity requirement.

Many of the students in our program are pre-professional students and are required to take the University CHEM I and CHEM II series (CHEM1103/CHEM1101L and CHEM1123/CHEM1121L plus the two semester organic chemistry series (CHEM3603/CHEM3601L and CHEM3613/CHEM3611L) in order to compete for admission to professional schools. This change will allow those students to complete ANSC BS degree requirements without the need for course substitutions. Students that take the CHEM1123/CHEM1121L will still have the 8 hours required to meet University (State minimum) core requirements and ANSC faculty have agreed that CHEM3603/CHEM3601L will meet prerequisite requirements for upper level courses in ANSC.

Bachelor of Science in Anthropology

The department of anthropology offers the Bachelor of Science degree in anthropology. The Bachelor of Science degree program is geared toward students with specializations in anthropological sciences. It is recommended for students planning to continue their education in basic or applied anthropological sciences in graduate or professional school. A BS degree in anthropology is also useful students planning to continue their education toward health or medical related careers.

5. PROGRAM SUMMARY

Major universities increasingly recognize the need to offer anthropology majors the option to pursue either a Bachelor of Arts or a Bachelor of Science degree. B.S. degree programs are geared toward students with specializations in biological anthropology and archeology, and provide rigorous training in the natural sciences and mathematics. Students with B.S. degrees in anthropology are particularly competitive for careers in medical and allied health professions, the federal government, and increasingly, in research and development divisions of large multinational corporations such as Proctor and Gamble, Intel, IBM, General Electric and Whirlpool.

A B.S. degree in Anthropology would be supported by existing faculty members in the Departments of Anthropology, Biology, Chemistry, Mathematical Science, Physics, Geosciences, and the Division of Agriculture. *Adding a B.S. option would come at no cost to UAF*. It would involve only redistribution of resources, and no new faculty, facilities, or equipment purchase.

The American Anthropological Association reports that 93 departments of anthropology offer a Bachelor of Science option to their majors (see attachment). *Our department needs a B.S. option to remain competitive with our peers. Students in the State of Arkansas need a B.S. option to remain competitive with their peers.*

6. NEED FOR PROGRAM

The Department of Anthropology responds to more than 200 inquiries each year from high school or college students who are interested in majoring in anthropology. One of the first questions students ask is "What can I do with an Anthropology major?" Based on: 1) results of surveys of 40 senior Anthropology majors in our required capstone course, *History of Anthropological Thought*, 2) surveys conducted by the American Anthropological Association, 3) information about health status in Arkansas, and 4) interviews with five Arkansas physicians, we find that we could add value to our Anthropology major at no cost by adding a B.S. option to our major.

The B.S. option would increase student competitiveness for graduate school, medical and other health-related professions, state and federal government positions, and positions with private firms by giving students increased exposure to research design, scientific methods, and analytical thinking.

Health Care. The most sensitive indicator of the health status of a population is its infant mortality rate. Arkansas' infant mortality rate (7.8 per 1,000 population) is more than double the national average of 3.2/1,000. Arkansas' dental health, levels of obesity, disability, mental health, and poor preventive health practices cry out for interventions. Children's health indicators in the State are particularly troubling. Forty percent of the State's children grow up in households where no one has a high school education. Effective programs must address issues of cultural diversity and be sensitive to differences in understandings. In Springdale, English is not the first language for 40 percent of the students in the public school system. A medical anthropologist, Deborah Erwin, at UAMS designed a program targeted at African American women in eastern Arkansas whose cultural beliefs about breast cancer led them to neglect screenings and other diagnostic and preventive health measures.

One fourth year medical student at UAMS felt strongly that her sensitivity to the Spanish-speaking population in Arkansas helped her give her a competitive edge when she interviewed for medical school. In her interview, she demonstrated that she empathized with immigrant populations who find navigating the health care system particularly perplexing. She recognized that standard medical categories may not reflect the disease categories used by Spanish-speaking patients.

A resident physician who majored in Biology at Hendrix College said, "I wish that I had majored in Anthropology." "I had no idea that I would deal with cultural differences on a daily basis. Many of the physicians that I work with are from India or the Middle East. I need to understand their perspectives. And, of course, I work with patients from all sorts of cultural and class backgrounds."

A prominent UAMS graduate who is now a brain surgeon practicing in New York City said, "I got interested in medicine when I excavated burials and studied how skeletons reflected diet and health."

A practicing anesthesiologist commented that, "I think that if I'd studied anthropology, I'd be more understanding of non-compliance; I think I'd understand my patients better. I bet I'd understand health care policy better, too."

Medical and allied health professionals with a B.S. degree in Anthropology will be sensitive to cultural practices, but they will also be trained to understand evidence-based medicine. Advanced courses in mathematics and the sciences will train students to conduct medical research in epidemiology.

A survey reported by Texas State University (available from their web site) showed that *nationwide*, *students who receive B.S. degrees in Anthropology have higher rates of acceptance in to medical schools than students who major in either Chemistry or Biology.* B.S. Anthropology majors not only fulfill the courses pre-requisite for medical or dentistry schools but also receive training in human osteology, forensics, and evolutionary anthropology. A. B.S. degree focused in biological anthropology is useful in applied health, and medicine; it is also useful epidemiology, public health, and graduate

programs in human biology and biological anthropology. Increasing the number of medical professionals is a critical need both on the state and national levels.

Dr. Jerome C. Rose has long been the advisor for pre-dental students at the University of Arkansas. Because Arkansas does not have a school of dentistry, Dr. Rose has developed links with dental schools in other states. Dr. Rose estimates that he has helped to place at least 100 students in dental schools in the past two decades. Dr. Rose regularly teaches a course in dental anthropology. Courses in evolutionary anthropology, medical anthropology, osteology, and human evolution are regularly taught by Professors Justin Nolan, Michael Plavcan and Peter Ungar. Three of these offerings are already cross-listed in the Department of Biological Sciences.

State and Federal Government. A recent article in the National Association of Professional Anthropology Bulletin (Fisk, 2008 *NAPA bulletin* 29: 110-130) reported that the federal government is the largest employer of anthropologists outside academia. Anthropologists are particularly well represented in the U.S. Census Bureau, National Park Service, National Marine Fisheries Service, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention(CDC), and USAID.

Long-time University of Arkansas Professors Charles R. McGimsey and Hester A. Davis, anthropology faculty members and founders of the Arkansas Archeological Survey, were instrumental in creating federal legislation in the late 1960s that ensured that any earth-moving project that involved federal monies would be accompanied by an archeological survey. The department enjoys a superb reputation in the fields of cultural resource management, collections management, and computer applications to archeology.

UAF has a strong state-based organization, the Arkansas Archeological Survey, which provides part-time employment, internships, and field experiences for our students. Arkansas Archeological Survey (ASS) Archeologists offer classes, internship opportunities, and summer field schools. These Ph.D.-level archeologists supplement the training that our department faculty provides. Archeology students also are encouraged to take courses in geosciences, physics, statistics, and mathematics. Our faculty already provides nationally recognized training in using geophysical techniques such as noninvasive electrical and magnetic testing and surveying. Archeologists collaborate with faculty in other fields to build virtual 3-D models and computer graphic models of ancient communities to simulate past living conditions. These models can show the effects of various changing environmental factors. Archeologists collaborate with zoologists (paleozoology) botanists (paleobotany) and require training in fields like soil and sediment analysis to date and reconstruct lifeways. Engineering and consulting firms and government organizations provide employment for our students. Starting salaries in these firms range from \$30,000-\$40,000.

Fiske (2008:118) estimates that there are nearly 1200 archeologists employed by the federal government. Furthermore, "The employment trends are positive and dramatic...each federal department and agency is responsible for ensuring that its actions, or those it permits, licenses, or funds do not destroy significant archeological resources..." The National Park Service is likely to lose

archeologists to retirement in the next five years. New archeologists are likely to be hired as a GS-7 or GS-9 and expect to work up to a 9, 11, or 12.

The recommendations of the 9/11 Commission opened opportunities for anthropologists to provide information for the military and defense, particularly in Iraq and Afghanistan. The Department of Defense hires both archeologists and cultural anthropologists. Anthropologists may be embedded with combat troops. This work, although well paid, is dangerous and creates ethical dilemmas for anthropologists who question how their research will be used..

Private Industry. The web site for the American Anthropological Association links a number of articles that detail how multinational corporations use anthropologists in their research and development efforts. Wal-Mart, for example, has used anthropologists to conduct marketing surveys, to manage focus groups, and to assess the traffic patterns and store layouts. Intel has used anthropologists to help develop low-cost microprocessors amenable to the needs of the populations of India and China. These positions may be permanent or temporary.

9. DESCRIPTION OF RESOURCES

Current library resources in the field.

The UAF library currently has sufficient resources to support a B.S. in Anthropology. In fact, it currently supports both M.A. and Ph.D. Programs in Anthropology. The UAF library houses approximately 5,500 book titles in Anthropology, subscriptions to 77 Anthropology journals (electronic and print), and subscribes to several databases of relevance to the proposed program, including Anthropological Literature, Sociological Abstracts, Medline, and PsycINFO, Web of Science, Biological Abstracts, and others.

Current instructional laboratory facilities.

The department currently has two fully-equipped anthropology teaching laboratories, and many of our faculty have individual research laboratories in which undergraduate students are trained to conduct research. Our archeology laboratory facilities include excavation equipment, wet labs, artifact processing labs, advanced microscopes, topographic and geophysical surveying instruments, photographic equipment (traditional and digital), and computers. Our biological anthropology

laboratory facilities include microscopes, thin-sectioning, x-ray, photographic equipment, osteological instruments, skeletal collections, morphometric and computer image analysis equipment.

Computer laboratory facilities.

Computer Labs are easily accessible in Old Main, nearby Ozark Hall, the J.B. Hunt Transport Services Inc. Center for Academic Excellence, and elsewhere. Windows pentium, Macintosh, and Unix labs are available together with state-of-the-art digitizing equipment, graphics stations, printers, plotters, and software through the Center for Advanced Spatial Technologies.

Classroom facilities.

The department uses classrooms in Old Main, Old Geology, the Arkansas Union, Chemistry Building, Fine Arts Center, J.B. Hunt, Kimpel Hall, Memorial Hall, Ozark Hall, the Science and Engineering Auditorium and Science and the Engineering Building. Many of our classes are taught in "smart rooms", and the department has five working laptop computers with projectors for those classes not taught in "smart rooms".

A B.S. in Anthropology would require no new resources for UAF. We currently have all the necessary faculty mentors, facilities, courses and other needed resources.

10. NEW PROGRAM COSTS = None.

There would be no new costs to this program. We expect that some of our majors would choose the B.S. option rather than the B.A., but we do not anticipate a major increase in numbers of majors overall. Therefore, there would be no new administrative costs associated with the new program. We already offer the courses that are to be included in the BS program. The science courses to be included as options for the B.S. already exist, as do courses in biological anthropology and archeology. Some of these are cross-listed—very multidisciplinary and heavy on science—a skill set most needed for practicing archeologists and biological anthropologists. We already have the faculty, library resources, facilities, and instructional facilities

11. SOURCES OF FUNDING

A B.S. in anthropology would require no new resources. All resources for the degree would be reallocated from the current B.A. program, since our majors would now be given a choice between the two.

- 1. The number of required credit hours in Biology is increased from 28 to 30.
- 2. Principles of Zoology (BIOL 1603/1601L) or Plant Biology (BIOL 1613/1611L) may substitute for Principles of Biology (BIOL 1543/1541L), and a maximum of four 1000-level credit hours can be applied toward the major. Previously, BIOL 1543/1541L was required and a maximum of eight 1000-level credit hours could be applied toward the major.
- 3. A new core of required classes is introduced, Cell Biology (BIOL 2533), General Genetics (BIOL 2323), Evolutionary Biology (BIOL 3023), and General Ecology (BIOL 3863). This core replaces categories/areas of biology in the current curriculum from which the students had to choose a predetermined number of classes.
- 4. The students will have to take one core laboratory course from BIOL 2321L or BIOL 2531L or BIOL 3861L, which is currently not a requirement.
- 5. The Bibliographic Practicum (BIOL 2001) course will be eliminated from the requirements.
- 6. The credit hours for biology electives are increased from 8-10 hours to 13 hours. These 13 hours must include at least 9 hours in BIOL courses numbered 3000 or higher and at least one BIOL course numbered 2000 or higher with a laboratory section. Previously, all electives had to be courses numbered 3000 or higher.
- 7. Three credit hours of statistics or Mathematical Reasoning are added to the requirements in cognate sciences (STAT 2023 or STAT 2003 or STAT 4003/4001L or MATH 2183).
- 8. A 3-hour requirement in Philosophy is added to the requirements for a BA in Biology (PHIL 2103 or PHIL 2203 or PHIL 3113 or PHIL 4213). THIS MAY AWAIT LATER APPROVAL.

1. The number of required credit hours in Biology is increased from 28 to 30.

Rationale. The number of credit hours is increased by two because 2000-level classes are now included in the electives. At the same time, students will still have to take a sufficient number of classes at the 3000-and-above level to comply with the 24-hour rule. 2000-level classes are included as electives because many of our BA students will enter programs in the allied health professions that require these courses as pre-requisites.

2. BIOL 1603/1601L (Principles of Zoology) or BIOL 1613/1611L (Plant Biology) may substitute for BIOL 1543/1541L (Principles of Biology), and a maximum of four 1000-level credit hours can be applied toward the major. Previously, BIOL 1543 was required and a maximum of eight 1000-level credit hours could be applied toward the major.

Rationale. Credit hours in 1000-level classes that can be applied toward the major are reduced so that more credit hours are available for the electives that now include 2000-level classes (same explanation as above under item 1). We expect that most

students will still opt to take Principles of Biology. However, by making Principles of Zoology and Plant Biology regular substitutes, it will be possible for them to apply the credit hours earned for one of these courses toward their major.

3. A new core of required classes is introduced, Cell Biology (BIOL 2533), General Genetics (BIOL 2323), Evolutionary Biology (BIOL 3023), and General Ecology (BIOL 3863). This core replaces categories/areas of biology in the current curriculum from which the students had to choose a predetermined number of classes.

Rationale. A core of biology courses is introduced as a new requirement to give students a broad overview of the biological sciences and to provide all students with the same knowledge base for the successful completion of upper-level classes in the biological sciences. Having a core of required classes will make planning much easier for the students and guarantee that they will fulfill pre-requisites for many of our upper-level classes. Having a core of required classes has already been proven highly beneficial for our Bachelor of Science majors.

4. The students will have to take a core laboratory, which is currently not a requirement.

Rationale. Scientific knowledge is acquired through observation and experimentation. To understand the process of science, not only BS, but also BA students should be exposed to some laboratory experience.

5. The Bibliographic Practicum (BIOL 2001) will be eliminated from the requirements.

Rationale. The practicum in its current form has become obsolete. Faculty feel that students are not sufficiently challenged by the practicum. They already have many of the skills being taught in the course (e. g. knowledge of how to conduct basic database searches). The practicum suffers from a disconnect between the formal bibliographic skills taught and the actual application of this knowledge. Finally, with increasing numbers of students, logistics will become increasingly difficult to maintain this course offering.

6. The credit hours for biology electives are increased from 8-10 hours to 13 hours. These 13 hours must include at least 9 hours in BIOL courses numbered 3000 or higher and at least one BIOL course numbered 2000 or higher with a laboratory section. Previously, all electives had to be courses numbered 3000 or higher.

Rationale. As already explained above, 2000-level classes are now included because they are pre-professional requirements for programs in the allied health professions. This will allow students to apply these classes toward their major. Since students still have to comply with the 24-hour rule, the total number of required credit hours is increased.

7. Three credit hours of basic statistics or Mathematical Reasoning are added to the requirements in cognate sciences (STAT 2023 or STAT 2303 or STAT 4003/4001L or MATH 2183).

Rationale. Basic knowledge in statistics is expected in many courses at the Department of Biological Sciences, not only in those that list STAT courses as a pre-requisite. Especially in the areas of ecology and genetics, knowledge of basic statistical methods is critical for successful participation in the courses offered in these areas.

8. A 3-hour requirement in Philosophy is added to the requirements for a BA in Biology from Introduction to Ethics (PHIL 2103) or Logic (PHIL 2203) or Environmental Ethics (PHIL 3113) or Philosophy of Science (PHIL 4213). THIS MAY AWAIT LATER APPROVAL.

Rationale. This is a previous Fulbright College core requirement that has been eliminated in the revised college core. To keep this requirement, it will be adopted as a requirement for the BA major in Biology. The biology faculty feels that Bachelor of Arts students in biology should have basic knowledge of the philosophical foundations of the natural sciences, which includes questions of ethics and the principles of logic. Many of our BA students will move on to careers outside science. However, they will still be confronted with the many areas in our society that are increasingly shaped by progress in the sciences and the ethical questions associated with this progress. For these students, it will be important to understand what science can do and what it cannot, and should not, do. Students will have a broader spectrum of choices with respect to the philosophy courses than in the current college core curriculum (4 courses vs 2 courses currently). This will give students an opportunity to choose topics that are closest to their interests.

- 2. An additional 26 hours of biological sciences, including:
 - a. **Biology Core** (13 hours): Cell Biology (BIOL 2533), General Genetics (BIOL 2323), Evolutionary Biology (BIOL 3023), General Ecology (BIOL 3863), and a minimum of one hour of Core Laboratory selected from Cell Biology Laboratory (BIOL 2531L), General Genetics Laboratory (BIOL 2321L), and General Ecology Laboratory (BIOL 3861L).
 - b. Biology Electives (13 hours): must include at least 9 hours in BIOL courses numbered 3000 or higher and at least one course numbered 2000 or higher with a laboratory. (Laboratory courses also include BIOL 399VH, BIOL 480V, BIOL 480VH, BIOL 499, and BIOL 499VH.)
- 3. Requirements in cognate science and mathematics include:

1. The Bibliographic Practicum (BIOL 2001) will be eliminated from the requirements.

Rationale. The practicum in its current form has become obsolete. Faculty feel that students are not sufficiently challenged by the practicum. They already have many of the skills being taught in the course (e. g. knowledge of how to conduct basic database searches). The practicum suffers from a disconnect between the formal bibliographic skills taught and the actual application of this knowledge. Finally, with increasing numbers of students, logistics will become increasingly difficult to maintain this course offering.

2. A 3-hour requirement in Philosophy is added to the requirements for a BS in Biology from Introduction to Ethics (PHIL 2103) or Logic (PHIL 2203) or Environmental Ethics (PHIL 3113) or Philosophy of Science (PHIL 4213).

Rationale. This is, in part, a previous Fulbright College core requirement that has been eliminated in the revised college core. To keep this requirement, it will be adopted as a requirement for the BS major in Biology. The biology faculty feels that Bachelor of Sciences students in biology should have basic knowledge of the philosophical foundations of the natural sciences, which includes questions of ethics and the principles of logic. Many of our BS students will move on to careers in science. They will still be confronted with the many areas in our society that are increasingly shaped by progress in the sciences and the ethical questions associated with this progress. For these students, it will be important to understand what science can do and what it cannot, and should not, do. Students will have a broader spectrum of choices with respect to the philosophy courses than in the current college core curriculum (4 courses vs 2 courses currently). This will give students an opportunity to choose topics that are closest to their interests.

3. For clarity, upper level lab courses are defined to include BIOL 399VH, BIOL 480VH, BIOL 499, and BIOL 499VH.

Rationale: Independent research courses such as those listed are carried out in the laboratory and/or field and thus meet our criteria as lab courses. The list is included for clarity.

Social Science (9 hours)

The purpose of the social science core is to introduce students to the breadth of inquiry in the social sciences — such as the study of ideas, the behavior of individuals, groups, institutions, and their interactions. The core should expose students to the history of and the challenges encountered in our complex, culturally diverse world.

American History and Civil Government

Under Arkansas law, no undergraduate degree may be granted to any student who has not passed a college course in American history and civil government. Courses offered by the University of Arkansas, any one of which will meet this requirement, are HIST 2003 History of the American People to 1877; HIST 2013 History of the American People, 1877 to Present; and PLSC 2003 American National Government.

Advanced Composition

Every undergraduate student at the University of Arkansas is required to take and pass ENGL 2003, a three-hour course in composition, unless exemption can be gained in one of the following ways: (1) by demonstrating a satisfactory writing ability on the Advanced Composition Exemption Examination. (2) by completing ENGL 2013 (Essay Writing), or (3) by achieving a grade of "A" or "B" in ENGL 1013 and a grade of "A" in ENGL 1023 in courses taken at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. ENGL 2003 will not count as part of the total number of hours required for a degree in the College of Engineering or School of Architecture. 1023 and complete 30 credit hours before taking the Advanced Composition Exemption Exam. The exam must be taken before the student has acquired 96 credit hours. The English requirement applies to all transfer students regardless of non-freshman composition courses taken at other schools. Junior and senior transfer students must take the examination at the time they enter the University of Arkansas. Students not gaining exemption from ENGL 2003 must register for the course before the last semester of their senior year. The examination will be graded in the following categories: (1) pass or (2) fail. Students who take and do not pass the Exemption Exam must take ENGL 2003.

Residence

...

The full senior year must be completed in residence except that a senior who has already met the minimum residency requirement will be permitted to earn not more than 12 of the last 30 hours in extension or correspondence courses or in residence at another accredited institution granting the baccalaureate degree. No more than six of these 12 hours may be correspondence courses. The minimum residence requirement is 36 weeks and 30 semester hours. Residency for the senior year is defined as a period during which the student must be enrolled in courses offered on the campus in Fayetteville. This is intended to provide adequate contact with the University and its faculty for each student who is awarded a degree. Colleges and departments have the authority to prescribe residence requirements that exceed those described here.

9. Reason for proposed action:

Due to the rapid economic development in China in the past twenty years, most of major US corporations have opened branches or factories there. In the past few years Wal-Mart has opened 146 stores covering 89 cities in China and has purchased much of its products in China factories. Tyson has opened two plants in China and is doing a lot of business there. These large corporations need many of their employees to have knowledge of the Chinese language and culture, as well as business communication skills in Chinese, both in their headquarters here in Arkansas and employees sent to China. In recent years, many small companies in local areas have also started to do business in China. For example, the newly established "World Trade Center" in Rogers by the UA Business School has been very active in facilitating such business opportunities for local small companies in China. So, Chinese language, especially with a business orientation, is in high demand now at the UA, since many UA students want to work in China or China-related businesses in the US after graduation. Many students in the current Chinese Program, as well as some students who have already finished the available Chinese courses here at the UA, have demanded to add more Chinese courses and want to get Minor in Chinese to become more competitive in today's job market. A Chinese Minor for students with a business or engineering major will greatly enhance their employability after graduation, especially at local companies doing business with China. Hopefully these students would then remain in Arkansas.

Other than working in companies/businesses related to China, there are many other opportunities for UA students in Communication, History, International Relations, Political Science and

Sociology whose minor is Chinese. As more interactions happen between US and China, there will be more government and society employment opportunities available to UA students who have strong background in Chinese language and culture.

At this time, there is no Chinese minor offered in the State of Arkansas. The University of Central Arkansas has recently added a Chinese Language Program. Some of the neighboring states, such as Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Alabama, and Tennessee have a Chinese Minor at their flagship state universities, but not with a business orientation.

By adding a Minor in Chinese Language with a business orientation at the UA, our Chinese Program will be very attractive to many students, and it will be very important in building a strong Asian Study Program here at the UA. Without a Chinese Minor degree, some students will be reluctant to take the optional higher-level Chinese courses in the program, and some students have even transferred to other universities to pursue such Chinese Minor degrees. The Minor in Chinese Language, especially with a business orientation, will help to keep Arkansas' best talents in Arkansas businesses.

The Chinese language has become a very popular second language for UA students in recent years. In fall, 2004, there was one full-time Chinese Instructor and four classes offered per semester, the total student enrollment for that semester was 59. A TA was added to the Chinese Language Program in spring 2006. Due to high student demand, in fall 2009, the Chinese Language Program has expanded to include one full-time faculty member, one visiting faculty member, and one part-time TA, with seven classes offered and about 130 students enrolled. Many students have asked to have a Chinese Minor or even a Major at the UA in the past few years. A recent in-class survey shows that more than 70% of the current students in the Chinese Program (total 103 students surveyed) would be interested in a Chinese Minor degree if it were offered at UA. In fall 2010 a new tenure-track Assistant Professor will be hired for the Chinese Program. With the number of teachers and courses offered now, we are well-prepared and ready to offer a Chinese Minor at the UA.

10. New option/concentration/emphasis objective:

Although a Minor in Chinese Language in general will be good for the students, a Minor in Chinese Language with a business orientation will be better for the employability of the students with such a degree. The students will not only master the basic Chinese language and culture, but will also become exposure to the language custom and culture related to China's business environment. The students going through the Chinese Minor Program will have knowledge and language skills related to business in China, which will make them very attractive to companies doing business with China.

There are two main goals for offering the Minor in Chinese Language with a business orientation. (1) The first is to provide well-trained employees with special knowledge in Chinese language and business culture for businesses, so they can be more competitive in today's global economy. Such compatibility is very important for the State of Arkansas' economy. (2) The second goal is to provide the students with education and opportunities for future employment. A Minor in Chinese Language will make the students more competitive in the job market and make them more attractive to the local companies doing business with China.

The students, after taking the required courses for the Minor, should be skillful in listening, speaking, reading, and writing Chinese to demonstrate Chinese language proficiency at one the following levels:
